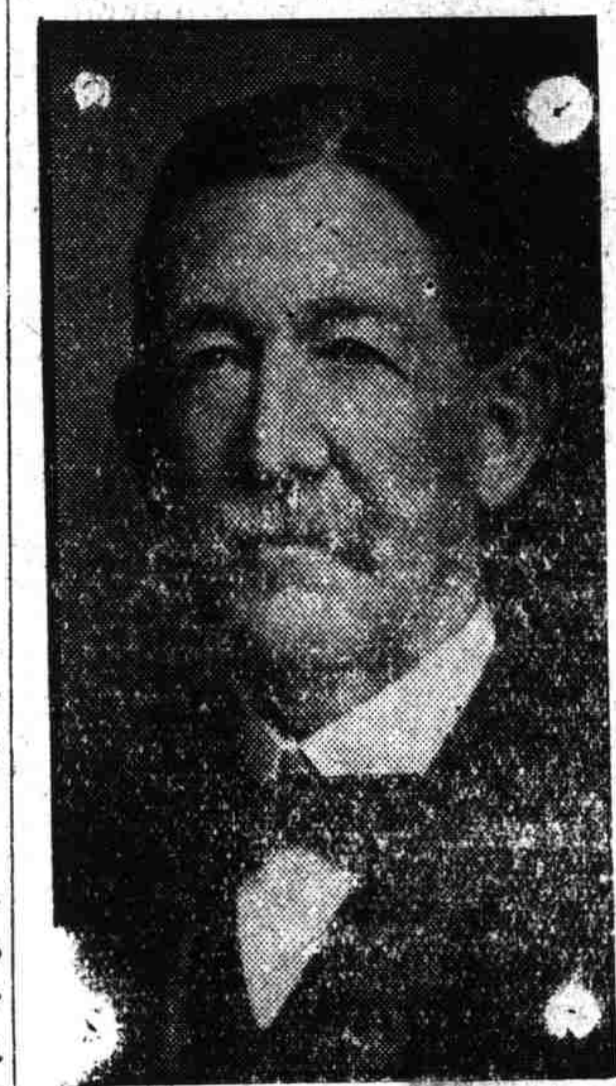

HON. J. A. LONG PASSES

He Was Roxboro's Foremost and Best Loved Citizen.

On Monday morning at half past three o'clock Hon. J. A. Long breathed his last. While he had been ill only about four weeks, still he had been far from well for some time, and his friends had noticed the decline. His death was caused by pneumonia. Mr. Long was almost seventy-five years old, and had spent his life in the County. He was passionately fond of the town, county and its people, and his greatest concern



was for the people he loved so well.

His parents were Ratliff J. and Mary Walters Long. He was twice married and leaves a wife, daughter, Mrs. R. J. Teague, and two sons, James A. Long, Jr. and M. R. Long.

The funeral services were conducted from the home, the services being simple, such as he would have had, for he was a man who scorned show. The services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. N. C. Yearby, assisted by Rev. D. F. Putnam, pastor of the Roxboro Baptist Church, Rev. Harry M. North of Durham, Rev. G. T. Rowe, D. D., of High Point, and Rev. S. B. Turrentine, D. D., of Greensboro. "How Firm a Foundation," "Lead Kindly Light," and "The Home of the Soul" was

sung by a selected choir.

Such an abundance of flowers has never been seen in this section, in fact they were so numerous that the floral bearers could not handle them but had to be sent to the grave in a wagon.

His friends came from all directions, the spacious yard being full of friends who wished to pay their last respect to their friend. Every business house in town was closed from 2 to 4:30 o'clock.

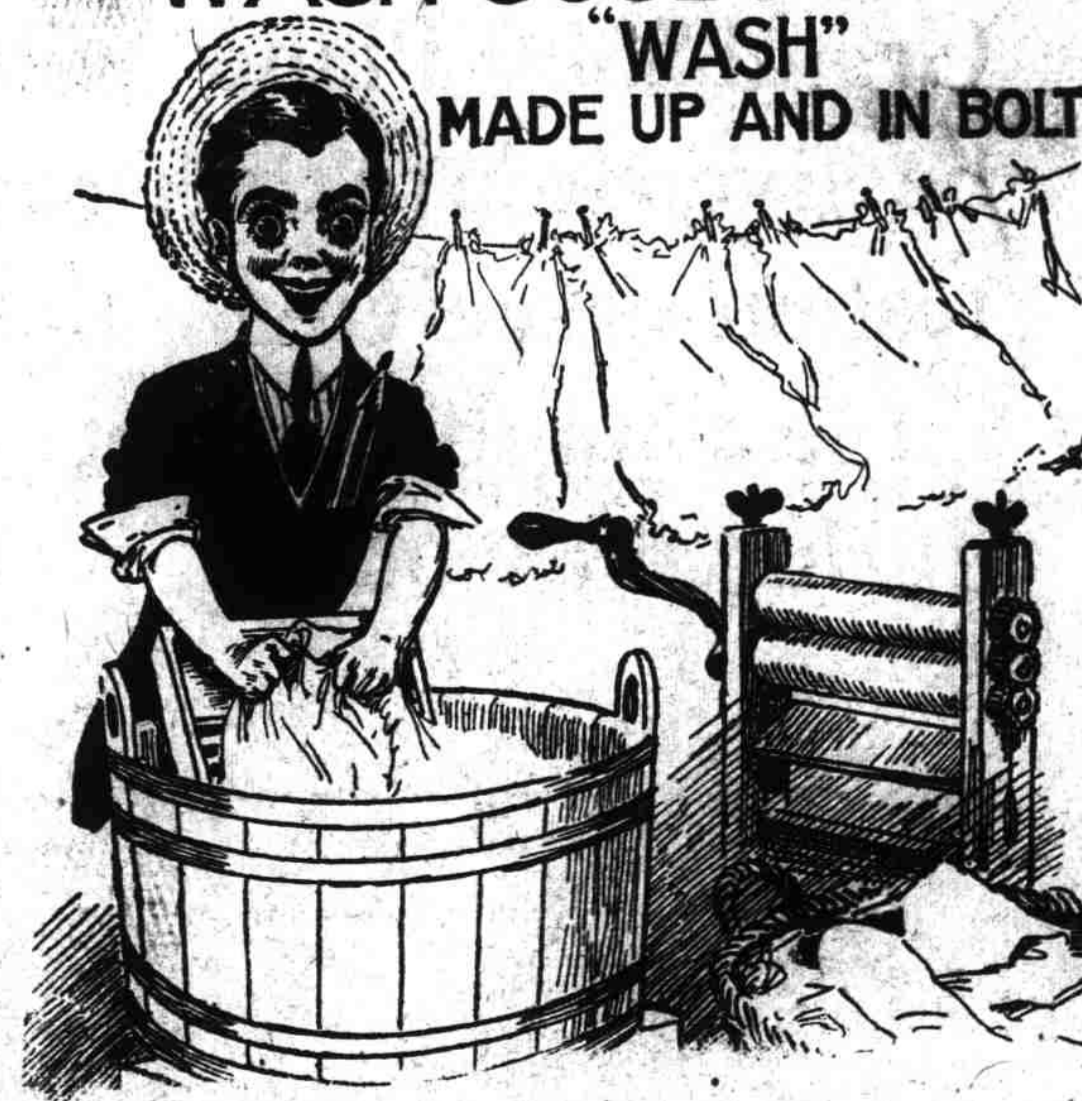
