Leo M. Frank Sentenced To Life Imprison

Atlanta, Ga., June 21.—Leo M. Frank today began serving a life sentence at the Georgia prison farm for the murder of Mary Phagan, the 14-year-old employe of the pencil factory, of which he was superintendent. His hurried secret trip by train and automobile from the Atlanta jail to Milledgeville was preceded by a few hours the issuance of a long statement by Governor Slaton giving his reasons for commuting the death sentence, which was to have been executed tomorrow, to life imprisonment.

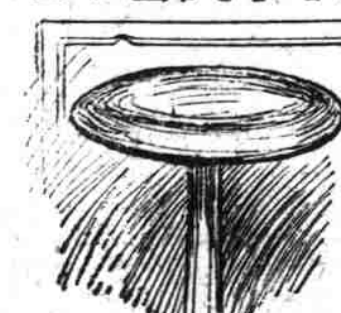
