COURT PROCEEDINGS

Criminal Docket Completed Tuesday—Cases Awarded \$50,000.

The following cases on the criminal docket were disposed of last week during Superior Court:

State vs. Thos. Leonard and Barton Charles. Indictment Transporting liquor. Motion judgement continued for 12 months.

State vs. Sid Dixon and Mary Bran. Indictment fornication and adultery. Jury verdict not guilty.

State vs. Sid Dixon. Indictment Assault with deadly weapon. Give bond to appear at next term of court.

State vs. Jasper Oakley. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Jury verdict guilty. Judgement suspended on payment of cost.

State vs. Abe Johnson. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Jury verdict guilty. Judgement suspended on payment of cost.

State vs. John Johnson. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Jury verdict not guilty.

State vs. Abe Johnson, and Bud Love. Johnson 30 days on roads.

State vs. Charlie Yellock. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Jury verdict guilty. Sentence to 30 days on road.

State vs. Norman Walker. Indictment assault with deadly weapon. Jury verdict guilty. Judgement suspended on payment of cost.

State vs. Lester Holloway. Indictment throwing rocks. Jury verdict not guilty.

State vs. Rudin Mitchell. Indictment larceny. Jury verdict guilty. 2 years on roads.

State vs. Ed Dixon. Indictment retailing. Jury verdict guilty. Twelve months on roads.

State vs. Lester Deshazo and Mrs. Sallie Morris. Indictment Seifa. Judgement absolute.

CIVIL DOCKET.
The first civil case was that of R. H. Gates vs. T. D. Winstead. The plaintiff suing for \$7000.00 damages for injuries inflicted by the defendant.

The case consumed two days, a verdict being rendered late Friday afternoon, giving Gates \$500.00 damages and placing the cost on Mr. Winstead.

This case was fought hard, and there was great deal of interest taken in it; the court house being packed throughout the case.

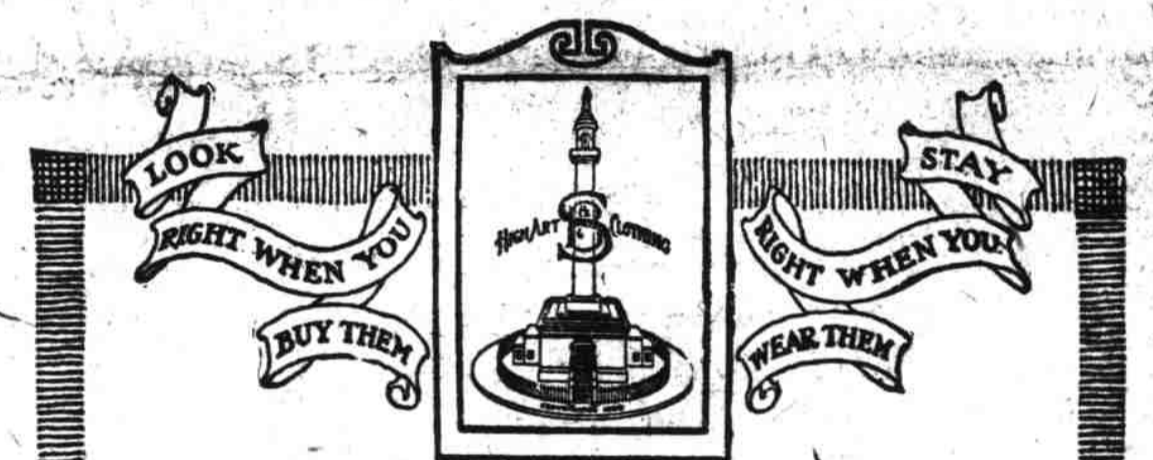
