senic and Arsenite of lime. 3rd, kerosene Emulsion. 4th, Dimé Sulphur mixture. 5th, Hellebore and Pyrethrum, these chemicals are alright for spraying and can be obtained from your drug stores here.

All kind of fruit tree work done pruning, planting, transplanting, propagation, plant breeding, hot beds, special attention given to my work, I make a specialty of cutting for the blight and pruning grape vines, drop me a card about your trees. Yours to serve,
