COURT PROCEEDINGS

\$2,500 VERDICT FOR HALL

SUPERIOR COURT ADJOURNED FRIDAY MORNING ONLY FEW CASES ON CIVIL DOCKET TRIED DURING THIS TERM.

The February term of Person County Superior court adjourned Friday morning. The criminal docket was completed Wednesday.

The following cases were tried on the Criminal docket:

State vs Roy R. Jones. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Guilty, fined \$10.00 and cost.

State vs. Sid Dixon. Indictment assault with deadly weapon. Defendant pleads guilty, fined \$25.00 and cost.

State vs. R. L. Webster. Indictment assault. Pleads guilty and fine of \$15 and cost imposed.

State vs. Frank Block. Indictment housebreaking. Defendant pleads guilty and receives sentence of 12 months on roads.

State vs. D. Evans. Charged with assault with deadly weapon. Pleads guilty, sentenced to six months on roads.

State vs Hallie Barnett. Indictment assault with deadly weapon. Pleads guilty and judgement suspended upon payment of cost.

State vs J. Johnson. Indictment larceny. Jury found defendant guilty. Sentenced to six months on roads.

State vs. Charlie Tripe. Indictment carrying concealed weapon. Pleads guilty, 2 months on roads.

State vs John Bradsher. Pleads guilty to carrying concealed weapon. Gets 3 months on roads.

State vs. Nick Woody. Charged with disturbing school entertainment. Defendant pleads guilty and is sentenced to 60 days on roads.

State vs. Bedford and Henry Taylor. Charged with manufacturing liquor. Bedford received 12 month and Henry 3 months on county roads.

State vs. Sam Guley. Charged with assault. Jury found defendant guilty and he was sentenced to 2 years on roads.

State vs. O'Bery Mason. Indictment incest. Verdict guilty, sentence 10 years in penitentiary.

State vs. Henry Taylor. Indictment manufacturing liquor. Prayer for judgement upon payment of cost. Defendant to appear at each February term and report, for which he is held under \$100 bond.

G. O. Hall vs. Norfolk & Western railway was the first case to come up on the civil docket. This case consumed the greater part of a day and a half. In this case Hall was suing for \$20,000 for injuries sustain while learning to become a fireman. He was struck by a passing car while standing a little ways out of an engine on another track. The jury awarded Hall \$2,500 damages. But the jury failed to answer a complaint, and the case will be tried again. The Railroad was represented by Attys Guthrie and W. D. Merritt and Ex-Gov. W. W. Kitchin and Mr. F. O. Carver appeared for Hall.

Nelson Walters vs. J. S. Bradsher, Trustee. Judgement for plaintiff.

J. E. Wade vs. Sheriff. Sheriff ordered to collect \$325 from Wade and assurety.

CLAUDE KITCHIN TO BE URGED TO KEEP STEP WITH PARTY

FEELING EXISTS THAT LEADER SHOULD YIELD SOMETHING FOR HARMONY.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Friends of Representative Kitchin are making an effort to induce him to yield something in the way of individual views in the interest of party harmony and dispatch of business in the House. They have told him, in fact, that if he does not lead he will be eliminated by the speaker or some other man who supports the President.

The attitude of Mr. Kitchin toward administration measures has been about like this:

1. He liked but little of the preparedness program.
2. He liked not the tariff commission plan.
3. He did not think well of the shipping bill.

These three things the Wilson administration is willing to stand or fall on.

It looks now as if Speaker Clark would lead for the national defense program; Representative Rainey for the tariff commission; and Representative Webb or somebody else for the shipping bill. That would leave Mr. Kitchin out.

Early next week, it is expected that Democratic leaders in the House will call upon Mr. Kitchin and outline to him the situation that has arisen in the ranks of the party due to his tactics. He will be told that all legislation is the result of compromise and that he cannot afford, either for his own interest or that of the party, to remain outside the ramparts and continue in his opposition to the measures which are endorsed by the Democratic administration.

SECRETARY GARRISON RESIGNS FROM CABINET

FAILURE OF CONGRESS TO ADOPT THE CONTINENTAL ARMY SCHEME CAUSE.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Secretary Garrison resigned today because President Wilson would not "irrevocably" support the continental army plan, and because he opposes the Administration's program of setting a definite time for Philippine independence.

President Wilson accepted the resignation but has not selected a successor. The President himself probably will take personal charge of the Administration's National defense plans in Congress.

Assistant Secretary Breckenridge also resigned as a mark of loyalty to his chief, whose views he shares. The President accepted his resignation. Both take effect immediately. Major General Scott, Chief of Staff of the Army, automatically becomes Secretary of War ad interim.

It is known that one of Secretary Garrison's principal reasons for his conviction that only a Federal continental army instead of a reorganized National Guard should be the main military dependence of the Nation.
