SUB. POSTOFFICE FOR R. J. REYNOLDS' PLANT

Washington, Feb. 12.—The Postoffice Department today agreed to permit Robert S. Galloway, of Winston-Salem, to establish in the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company plant a sub-postoffice for the benefit of the 3,500 persons employed there. Big concerns in larger cities have such offices. Winston-Salem is one of the live cities of the South.
