## BICKETT CARRIED THE COUNTY

Tucker, Hall, Thompson, Webb, Reade, Montague and Long Nominated—Old State Ticket Carries The County.

Hon. T. W. Bickett carried Person County by a majority of 133 votes in the race for governor. All old officers on the ticket carried this county with the exception of Lacy, Mann getting a substantial majority for State Treasurer.

The following is the official vote in Person County for State offices:  
FOR GOVERNOR—T. W. Bickett, 363; E. L. Daughtridge, 227. For Secretary of State—Clark, 14; Grimes, 329; Hartness, 233. For Treasurer—Mann, 377; Lacy, 197. For Attorney General—Calvert, 84; Jones, 8; Manning, 478; Sinclair, 3. For Commissioner Labor and Printing—Dellinger, 85; Shipman, 360. For Corporation Commissioner—Bord, 65; Lee, 471. For Commissioner of Agriculture—Graham, 390; Hobbs, 47; McKinnon, 123. For Insurance Commissioner—McClenaghan, 223; Young, 344.

President Wilson received 327 votes for President and Thos. Marshall received 374 for Vice-President.

Dr. E. J. Tucker was nominated for State Senator by a big majority. Mr. Cooper Hall also received a good majority for House of Representatives. The following are the official votes for county offices:

## EARL KITCHENER AND ENTIRE STAFF PERISH

When Cruiser, on Way to Russia is Sunk Off Orkneys.

London, June 6.—Earl Kitchener, British minister of war, and his staff were on board the British cruiser Hampshire, which was sunk by a mine or torpedo off the Orkney Islands last night.

It is feared that all were lost. Four boats were seen to leave the Hampshire, but a heavy sea was running.

Only a capsized boat and some bodies have been found.

Early Kitchener was on his way to Russia.

Admiral Jellicoe, commander of the British grand fleet, reports there is little hope that there were any survivors.

Sir William Robertson, chief of the imperial staff, is in London.

The names of the members of Earl Kitchener's staff have not yet been learned.

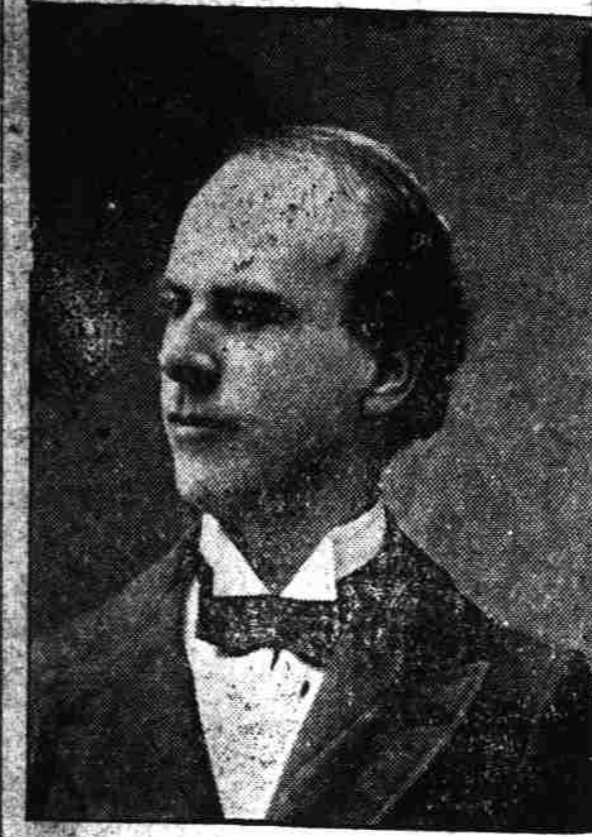

## DR. E. J. TUCKER

Democratic Nominee For The Senatorial District Composed of Granville and Person.



Dr. Tucker is a native of Virginia but in early childhood moved to North Carolina, and has been a resident of Roxboro for twenty-five years. There are few men in the County who enjoy the confidence and respect of the people as Dr. Tucker. He is a conscientious Christian gentleman, a live, progressive citizen and will represent this District in a manner befitting his ability.

Two years ago when the nomination for the house was not sought by anyone, owing to the fact that the County was considered close, he was nominated and almost forced to take it, as he did not want to enter the political field, but his friends knew if there was a man in the County who could win, it was Dr. Tucker. The election returns showed the wisdom of the nomination as he received the largest majority of any candidate in this County since the old times. And his nomination this time, over a popular competitor, shows his strength again, for he was nominated by the people, the farmers if you please. Leave out the vote of Roxboro and he was nominated by the farmers with a majority of about one hundred votes. Of course, Roxboro voted almost unanimously for him, making his majority about two hundred and fifty.

Roxboro and Person County are proud of Dr. Tucker and wish that Virginia would contribute more of his kind.
