LOOKS MORE LIKE WAR WITH MEXICO

NATIONAL GUARD CALLED OUT BY THE PRESIDENT

MEXICAN SITUATION GRAVE

North Carolina to Furnish Over 3,000 Men—Mobilize At Camp Glenn.

After conferring during the greater part of Tuesday with various members of his cabinet, President Wilson late in the afternoon sent telegrams to the governors of every state instructing them to immediately mobilize the state militias of their respective states. The troops will be held at the various points of mobilization, which have been designated, and as General Funston calls for additional troops, portions of each state militia will be sent to the border.

As General Funston has asked for additional troops from time to time it is expected portions of each state militia, as soon as mobilized, will be sent to the border.

Secretary of War Baker said that naturally the troops that could be moved with the least delay would be the first to be ordered to the border. Troops from all the Middle Atlantic states will probably be on the border by the middle of the week.

The attitude of Carranza commanders in the northern part of Mexico, who are acting under instructions from General Carranza, indicates what the real feeling toward the continuance of American troops in Mexico is. General Pershing has called the bluff of General Trevino, who served notice that should the American troops in Mexico move in any direction other than toward the American border, he would attack them, by notifying the Carranza general that his threat would not have the least influence on movement of American troops in Mexico. General Pershing has tightened up his line of communication and made every preparation, not only to repel an attack, but for an aggressive campaign.

War Vessels to Mexican Waters

Simultaneously with the call for the militia, Secretary of the Navy Daniels ordered additional warships to Mexican waters. He has instructed Admiral Winslow, on the west coast to have a ship in every port to take care of Americans. Captain Burrage commanding the Nebraska at Vera Cruz, has been notified to the same effect.

Installation Service.

A commission from the Presbytery will be here Thursday evening 8 o'clock for the purpose of installing the Rev. C. E. White as pastor of the Presbyterian church. The Revs. Mr. Rankin of Greensboro, Mr. McIver and Satterfield of Durham and Mr. Clayton of Milton, and Elder Mr. Jordan of Durham, compose the commission. Mr. Rankin will remain over until Saturday, and Friday morning at 10 o'clock there will be a communion service at the church.

Service will be conducted also Friday evening 8 o'clock at which time Mr. H. L. Crowell, Elder-elect, will be installed. The public is cordially invited to attend these services.
