NOW THE TIME TO BEGIN FIGHT ON MOSQUITOES.

With the advent of August the malarial-bearing mosquito becomes more active than ever. All that section of North Carolina from Rowan County to the sea is more or less menaced by this easiest of preventable diseases. The degree of danger depends entirely upon the intelligence and vigilance of the individual communities in their efforts at prevention.

Now that the heavy summer rains are probably for the most part over, the hot days and nights of the next two months mean that anopheles mosquitoes will breed by the billion.

The State Board of Health suggests that the people in every village, community and small town—and city where there is no live health department, take a day off and see that every ditch, filled-up branch or other place where a mosquito delights to live, is thoroughly drained and all the grass and vegetation cleaned off. If this simple procedure, coupled with the daily small dose of quinine in infected localities, were begun now and repeated a few times un-

til frost, thousands and thousands of dollars could be saved and much suffering could be easily prevented, to make no mention of the lives saved.

Organize and start the fight right now. A life saved in North Carolina is worth as much as a life saved on the Mexican border.

PRIMITIVE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Three Day Session At Flat River—Largest Crowds In History of Association.

The Lower County Line Primitive Baptist Church held their Association at Flat River beginning last Friday and continuing through Sunday. One of the largest crowds ever witnessed by many was in attendance Sunday. All three days large crowds were present.

Automobiles after automobiles carried large crowds from Roxboro and trains reaching here morning and night brought numbers of people.

The three-day session came to an end Sunday night. Wheeler's church, was selected as the meeting place for 1917. Officers of the association are: W. A. Warren Prospect Hill, re-elected moderator; Joseph H. Gooch, Stem clerk; G. C. Farthing, Durham, assistant clerk. Estimates place the attendance at the gatherings from Person, Durham and Granville counties at 6,000. Bounteous meals spread on tables under oak groves and preaching from an arbor presented a background of rustic simplicity that combined to attract huge crowds from the countryside around. COMMISSIONERS MEET

\$600 APPROPRIATED FOR DEMONSTRATION

In All Day Session Monday—J. M. Pass Elected Road Supervisor—H. A. Gentry Re-elected County Home Superintendent—Lively Meeting.

The County Commissioners met in their regular monthly meeting Monday morning at ten o'clock with all members present.

The usual routine of work, auditing and paying bills, was taken up in the morning session.

Register of Deeds Montague served his first time as clerk to the board. A full settlement was made with Mr. W. E. Webb in the morning session.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the board and a copy ordered to be spread upon the minutes of the meeting and presented to the family:

"Whereas Mr. William E. Webb has resigned as Register of Deeds of Person county. Be it resolved: By the board of Commissioners in meeting assembled that we wish to express to Mr. Webb our thanks and appreciation, as well as the thanks and appreciation of the people of the county for his faithful and efficient service as Register of Deeds and Clerk to the board."

His services have always been of the best, he has always been very kind and courteous to the people of the county and while we had to accept his resignation it was with a feeling of regret and we hope and trust that he will be restored to his good health."

"Ordered that the above be spread on the minutes of the board." Signed: E. B. Reade, Chairman, C. H. Hunter and J. E. Montague, Commissioners."

The commissioners adjourned at 12 o'clock and convened again at 1:30 p. m.

The afternoon session Mr. W. D. Merritt appeared before the commissioners with a letter from a Mr. Holloway of Rowan county applying for the position of Standard weight keeper for the county. It was decided by the commissioners it was unnecessary to create such an office in this county.

Mr. T. D. McLean, District Demonstration Agent who has charge of twenty-six counties of Demonstration work including this county, addressed the commissioners for about twenty minutes in the interest of continuing Farm Demonstration work in this county. Mr. McLean's talk clearly showed the value of Demonstration work and how much it would mean for Person county. There were several talks made before the commissioners on this subject, and after hearing all sides of the question, the commissioners adjourned to another room and held a private consultation with Mr. McLean. In a few minutes the board returned to the Clerk's office and announced that they had decided to make an appropriation of \$50 per month for Farm Demonstration, which is \$10 a month more than the last appropriation. As to the Demonstrator it is generally understood that a suitable man, A. & M. College graduate, probably, will be sent here later in the fall.

There were seven applicants for Road Supervisor and after due consideration being given all, Mr. J. M. Pass was appointed by the board at the same salary of \$75 per month.

There were also a number of candidates for County Home Superintendent, the number being five. Mr. H. A. Gentry was re-elected for the coming year at the salary of \$25 per month.

This concluded the business of the board for the day.

Person County Superior court convenes in Roxboro next Monday morning. Both the criminal and civil dockets are crowded for this term of court and it is expected that court will be in session all next week. This of course, is due to not having the April term of court.
