MR. W. E. WEBB DEAD

Prominent And Well Beloved Citizen Passes Away. Funeral Sunday Morning.

Mr. W. E. Webb died at his home on South Main Street Friday afternoon at 6:15 o'clock, after a lingering illness of several weeks.

In the death of Mr. Webb the County has lost a valuable asset, for few men in the County knew the inside workings of the affairs of the County as did he. He was 68 years old and for twenty four years he has served as Register of Deeds, and during all of that long term hardly a man can be found who was not proud to say "Mr. Webb was my friend," for he was indeed a friend to any one in need who appealed to him. He had been in bad health for several months and on account of this he resigned his office on July 31st, at the same time sending in his resignation as candidate for the office to which he was nominated in the May primaries.

Mr. Webb was a faithful member of the Methodist church and his pastor always knew he had a friend and a worker he could count on.

The funeral exercise was conducted from the home on Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, by his pastor, Rev. O. W. Dowd. On behalf of the County officials Rev. J. A. Beam spoke as to his work as a County official, the choir rendered the following songs: "It is well with my soul," "Abide with me," "There is rest for the weary," and "Thy will be done."

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ella Jordan Webb, and the following children: Mrs. R. W. Wilkerson, Miss Aline Webb and R. M. Webb, of Roxboro; E. V. Webb, Kinston; T. A. Webb, South Boston, Va.; E. L. Webb, Thomasville; C. J. Webb, New York; Mrs. J. M. Allen, Louisville, and a stepdaughter, Mrs. Mamie Bradsher, of Roxboro, also a half sister, Miss Anna Webb, of Roxboro.

The pallbearers were composed of members of the board of stewards of the Methodist church and were as follows: W. R. Hambrick, W. A. Sergeant, R. A. Burch, E. G. Long, C. C. Cunningham and J. A. Loug. The floral bearers were: D. W. Bradsher, N. S. Thompson, E. M. Davis, Rev. J. A. Beam, F. O. Carver, P. T. Freeland, Dr. E. J. Tucker, and D. S. Brooks. The honorary pallbearers were A. R.
