

NO FOOD NOW FOR NEUTRALS

The just decision of the Export Council's Administrative Board concerning shipments of grain to Holland shows that Mr. McCormick and his associates are thoroughly familiar with all the facts upon which their policy should be based.

The Administrative Board has now decided that no American grain shall go to Holland or any other European neutral country before December, and that if shipment is permitted in that month there must be absolute proof that the supplies are needed by the neutrals themselves and will not help Germany in any way.

Holland was asked by the Board to unload the ships and use them in bringing to this country the stocks of wheat in Australia and Java's accumulated surplus of sugar.

Holland might have a part of the grain for her own people. We have not enough wheat for ourselves and our war partners.

Supplies of grain are lower in other northern neutral countries than in Holland, and their new crops are small. But they would now have much more food on hand if they had not sold to Germany what they should have retained for their own use.
