They formulated plans for the Food Campaign of Person County, which begins throughout the State Saturday, October 27th.
The pledge cards are to be distributed throughout the County by our public school teachers, and it is to be hoped the people will respond at once, and return the signed pledge cards to the teachers without delay.

TOBACCO SELLING HIGH ON ROXBORO MARKET
All Grades Higher This Week Than Last—Official Average For Entire Market For Past Two Weeks \$34.69
Tobacco continues to go higher on the Roxboro market, and the farmers are bringing it in, big sales at all warehouse the past two weeks.
We were unable to give the official figures for week before last in our last week's paper, but we are publishing below the number of pounds sold on the Roxboro market for the two weeks closing Friday Oct. 19th, with the amount sold for and the average.
No. of pounds sold: 866,996; which brought \$300,566.20, an average of \$34.67 for the two weeks closing Oct. 19th.
The prices on all grades of tobacco is higher this week than last.
