THE CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING CASE AT NASHVILLE

This was the first suit in the Carolinas or Virginia in which the cooperative marketing association has brought an injunction to compel a signer to deliver his crop, to pay a penalty of five cents a pound for each pound he had sold outside the association, and to pay the expenses of the association in prosecuting him, all of which thing are called for by the contract. And in spite of all that attorneys, warehousemen and dealers fighting cooperative marketing could do, farmers backed the contract. Speaking under the solemn auspices of a great court trial intended to break up cooperative marketing, what did these distinguished attorneys say? Did they say that cooperative marketing is a futile thing, a thing that can never amount to much, no matter how many farmers go into it? Did they say that cooperative market-
