#### FIND BONES OF 5,000,000 B. C.

Scientists See Confirmation of Theories in Discovery of Oldest Dinosaur's Bones in China.

New York.—Discovery of the skull and skeleton of a dinosaur that roamed Asia 5,000,000 years ago has been made scientific expedition, officials of the American Museum of Natural History announce. The dinosaur, according to authorities, antedated any specles found in the United States.

The skull and skeleton were found in central Mongolia, and are said to be of vast importance to paleontologists in confirming the theory that Asia was the source of many immigrant faunae of western North America during the latter part of the age of reptiles and the early part of the age of grammals.

Important to See That Goslings Are Kept Dry

Goslings should not be removed from the nest until the third day after hatching, as it is important to see that they are quite dry, and should be kept warm and dry until they are feathered

They should not be fed until thirty-ix to forty-eight hours old, at the same time be offered a lukewarm drink, Their first few days' feed consists of oatmenl, hard-boiled egg and shorts or bran, thoroughly mixed to a crumbly mass. Lettuce or red clover chopped fine and mixed with the food serves as a tonic and is greatly relished by them. Feed every two or three hours just what they will clean up quickly. After the first few days the egg may be omitted and the food slightly moistened, but never be fed sloppy, sticky, too dry; cornmeal may also be added to the mixture. After the first few weeks gradually

They should not be allowed to get wet; their water should always be fresh but not cold, and plenty of sand should always be near, though sand should never be mixed with th

Goslings require dry and warm qu ters at night, at the same time plenty of ventilation, and their quarters kept clean and sanitary; damp quarters will cause them to become lame. Their sleeping compartment is best when thickly bedded with straw.

After the first week, when the weather is warm and dry, they will grow faster when given free range to roam about, for they enjoy feeding on tender

### Shade for Young Stock

Is of Great Importance The importance of shade for young stock should be constantly kept in mind, especially for late hatched chicks which have not had an opportunity to get a good start before the scorching

These chicks must be pushed alon without a letup, given every advantage of proper feeding and care. If this is done, if they are supplied with fresh water or milk to drink and the founts are kept sterilized and clean and shade is provided they will, in truth, gro

A range in the orchard is the best place in which to start them out, after which they can be transferred to the edge of a field of growing corn, provided colony coops are available, and they should be, if you wish the most economical results in raising the young flock.

But shade is imperative and should not be neglected.

#### Brooder Pneumonia Is Caused by Common Mold

Brooder pneumonia is caused by a ommon mold present in the incubator. brooder or in straw; often the egg-producing organs are affected by it, so that a chick batched from an infected that a chick natched from an infected egg lins the disease. It affects chicks under four weeks old, they become sleepy, with feathers ruffled and the head drawn down; breathing is Inbored and the windplpe is patched with the mold spores. The disease usually is not cured once it attacks the chicks, and when a brooder is known to be contaminated it should be fum! gated, the old straw removed and fresh litter provided, and the poultry dying from this disease should always
