THREE HUNDRED PERSONS ARE DROWNED IN ITALIAN VILLAGE

Lake Dam Neas Bergamo Barte and Lets Loose Avalanche of Fload

VILLAGES WIPED

Red Cross Organizes Relief-Dispatches Say Tracedy Happened Forty Miles From Milan

The heavy rains which have been falling for the post weeks caused the stream to overflow and filled the lake to the bursting point. Millions of cubic yards of water were let loon and the terrific force of the flood awept overything before it. The village of Dezzo, originally containing 600 inhabitants, and the adjacent villages of Menaggio and Teveno, were directly in the line of the rushing waters and were inundated. Many of the people, how ever, were appraised of the break in the dike and fied, together with hundreds of other refugees to the hills.

Red Cross relief has been organ_ ized and the government is using all efforts to aid the sufferers.

A dispatch from Rome says it is believed the number of casualties due to the bursting of the Lake Gleno dam will exceed three hundred. An avalanche of water from the lake was precipitated four thousand feet

destroying many villiages. The artificial lake was situated in the fertile valley of Camenica, about 500 feet above sea level. The bursting of the dike was followed by tragic scenes. The whole valley of Dezzo is devastated and eight villages, at least, have been blotted out. Dezezo itrelf was completely destroped by the waters, which covered every house. Only the church steeple can be seen Five generating plants were so hadly damaged that the city of Bergamo is without lighting power.

The stricken people number into the theusands and army units have been dispatched to the devastated zone to open up kitchens. Army engineers will give every possible aid in the reconstruction work. The dike was 50 fee in height
