ON ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE \$50,000 SEWER EXTENSION BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF ROXBORO, NORTH CAROLINA, as follows:

Section 1. That the Town of Roxboro issue its bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act in an amount not exceeding Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) for the purpose of extending the existing sanitary sewerage system of said Town.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the Clerk and is open for public inspection.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, in which event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided in said act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 24th day of June, 1924, and was first published on the 25th day of June, 1924. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF ROXBORO, NORTH CAROLINA, as follows:

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, in which event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided in said act.
