PROGRAM EPHESUS-CLEMENT FIELD

Next Sunday at Clement; Sunday School at 10 o'clock, Church service at 11 a. m.

Many no doubt will be interested to read this bit of history concern ing Ephesus Church as found in a letter written by Mr. W. Mr. Faulicmar, a member, just before his death. Mrs. A. J. Greene had this letter in posession and was written and sealed 23 years ago. I opened this letter with a great deal of interest.

The church was first organized November 21st, 1835, by the following Presbytery: Rev. John G. Mills father of Jack Mills and Prof. and Luther Mills, Rev. James King and Rev. Thus King: With the following members: Benjamin Wallebur ton and wife, John Gravett and wife Obadiah Faulkner and wife, Joseph Moore and wife, James Ferrell, John Dixon, Thomas Wilson, Eather Adams and Agnes Austin.

Rev. James King served as pastor from 1835 until 1845, ten years at a salary of from \$40 to 45 per year, 1846 was a very sickly year and the church had no regular preaching during the sickness.

The church called Bro. Wart president of Wake Forest College, He had a meeting of 17 days with the aid of Rev. Elias Dodson, and the results of the meeting were the addition of many good members. He accepted the call as pastor for the year 1846. The church extended a call to Rev. John G. Mills and he accepted as a supply for the year Then the church called Rev. J. J. James and he accepted and served from 1847 to 1853 up to the time he became the Editor of the Biblical Recorder. The letter gives a list of the pasters who served the church until the death of Rev. J. H. Lambeth, June 1899, who served the church for 13 years.
