Designating October 4th to 10th As Fire Prevention Week

The State of North Caroline has years led in efforts to reduce fire uste and its attendant loss of life and property. October 4th to 10th inclusive has been designated as Fire Prevention Week throughout the United States, and I appeal to our citizenship who are so familiar with the destruction of fire to become vitally interested in this great conomic waste.

The fire loss in the United States last year (1924) was more than five Mundred and fifty millions of dol lars with more than 17,000 person killed and a vastly larger number cuppled and maimed for life. North Carolina's share in this less was more than five million three hundred and twenty thousand dollars with 343 lives and hondreds of our people maimed. It is well known that carelessness and ignorance of fire hazard go hand in hand as the chief causes of our great NATIONAL BONFIRE.

I. therefore, urge that the week of Fire Pervention Week in accordance with Section 6080 of the Consolidated Statutes, which provides that the Governor of North Carolina shall, each year in October, issue a proc lamation urging the people to a prop-

During this week I also urge that fire drills be held in schools, factories and stores, and that they be con-

tinued at regular intervals; That schools, theatres, churches public and private hospitals and institutions, factories, stores and hotels De inspected to see that every safe-guard against fire is provided, and that exit facilities are sufficient in case of fire;

That local authorities examine their five ordinances and make them sufficient if they are lacking in any

To this end I urge our citizens to horoughly cooperate with our Insurance Department, and that every Mayor issue a proclamation. I earn-eatly request the cooperation of every citizen, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Clubs, Kiwanis and Women's Clubs, and all other civic bodies and the press. As October 4th comes on Sunday I especially appeal to the Ciergy and Sunday School Superintindents to bring this to the atten-

on of their people. Now, therefore, I, A. W. McLeau, overnor of North Caroline, in accordance with law, do issue this my welamation, and I do set aside and

October 4th to 10th, 1925 as Fire Mrs. Geo. L. Carrington Prevention Week and to urge all the people to a proper observance of this week in obecience to the statutes of North Carr
