Demonstration of Cream Seperators by Two or Three Companies

Prof. B. I. Satterfield, chairman of the Dairy Department of the Farmers' Council, will have charge of the program in the afternoon Saturday, May 1st. He will have the following speakers:

Dairying in Piedment Carolina: Mr. W. K. Scott of Alamance County, Demonstration of Cream Separators by representatives of two or three standard companies,

There will be a short business meeting of about 15 minutes, and each speaker will be limited to 30 about an hour and a quarter. The cream separators will be in operation both before and after the meeting, in order that every one may have an opportunity to examine them and ask questions. We plan to have the actual separation of the cream-pour milk into the bowl and separate it, so you can see cream come out of one spout and milk from another.
