DAIRY DEPARTMENT OF FARMERS' COUNCIL

Demonstration of Cream Separators by Two or Three Companies

Prof. B. I. Satterfield, chairman of the Dairy Department of the Farmers' Council, will have charge of the program in the afternoon of Saturday, May 1st. He will have the following speakers:

Old Six Cow; Mr. A. C. Kimery of State College.

Dairying in Piedmont Carolina; Mr. W. K. Scott of Alamance County. Demonstration of Cream Separators by representatives of two or three standard companies.

There will be a short business meeting of about 15 minutes, and each speaker will be limited to 30 minutes, so the program will cover about an hour and a quarter. The cream separators will be in operation both before and after the meeting, in order that every one may have an opportunity to examine them and ask questions. We plan to have the actual separation of the cream—pour milk into the bowl and separate it, so you can see cream come out of one spout and milk from another.

Every one interested in any phase of farming has a cordial invitation to any meeting held by the Farmers' Council.

INTERESTING MEETING

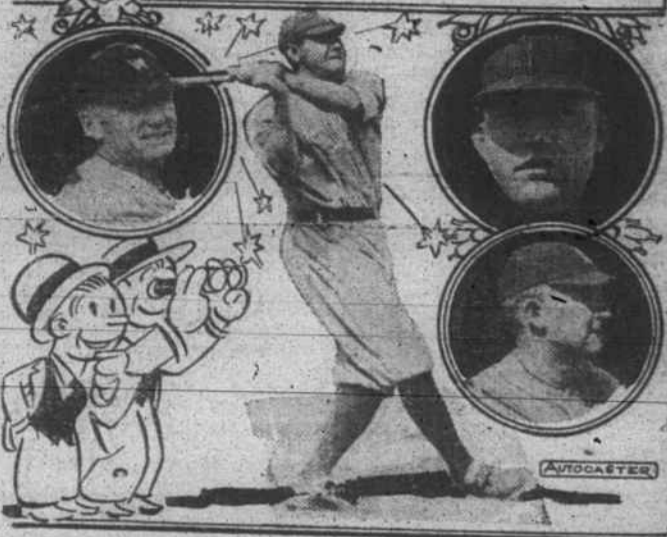
Of the Poultry Department of the Farmers' Council.

His slogan was "three cows and one hundred hens" on every farm. We wish our people would listen to men who know and follow such advice, for if we succeed in making a success of farming new lines must be adopted.
