#### CARUSO GETS TEN-YEARS FOR KILLING PHYSICIAN

Brooklyn, N. Y. — Francesco Caruso, the Italian immigrant, who killed Dr. Casper S. Pendola because his son died while under the physician's care, was sentenced to serve 10 to 20 years in Sing Sing by County Judge McLaughlin in Brooklyn.

#### 23 PLANES, 2 BLIMPS, SEEK THREE LOST NAVY FLIERS

Washington, D. C. — One of the most extensive aerial searches ever organized is in progress seeking the 3 missing naval fliers who disappeared while flying an amphibian plane between Hampton Roads and Annapolis. Twenty-three airplanes and two army blimps sweep Chesapeake Bay for lost navy fliers. The flyers, Commander T. A. Ellyson, the Navy's first air pilot, Lieutenant Commander Hugo Schmidt and Lieutenant Roger Ranshausen, mysteriously disappeared after they left the Norfolk Station on a flight to bring Ellyson to the bedside of his 12-year-old daughter, who is ill.

#### BUILDING GALLONS FOR DOOMED AMERICAN GIRL

Montreal, Can. — Carpenters are busy building the gallows that will end the life of Julia Palmer McDonald, former Mount Vernon, (N. Y.) society girl, on March 23rd. If the frantic campaign for commutation of her death sentence fails. On the same day her young husband, George McDonald, is scheduled to die, also. They were convicted of killing a Montreal Taxi Cab driver.

#### ARTIST'S MODEL INHERITS HALF MILLION—TO WORK ON

Philadelphia, Pa. — Peggy Burns, pretty artist's model, gets a real birthday surprise as she reaches age of 21. Finding her home in Washington, Pa., she learned that her grandfather, Michael J. Burns, who died 21 years ago had willed to her over \$500,000. She said her new found wealth would not turn her head and that she would continue to work.

#### BLIND FOR 20 YEARS, WOMAN REGAINS SIGHT

Chapel Hill, Ind., Mar. 4. — After 20 years of blindness, Mrs. Carrie Sillery, seventy years old, sees again, awaking from a nap. Mrs. Sillery, who lives on a farm, said she began to depict various objects in the room. The cause has proved mysterious.

#### FIFTY YEARS OLD MOTHER AWAITS EXECUTION

Tucson, Arizona, March 6. — Mrs. Eva Duncan, who, at fifty, is awaiting execution for the murder of A. J. Mathis, teacher. She is the first woman to face the gallows in Arizona.

#### TWENTY-FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS FOR A KISS

Washington, D. C., March 6. — Twenty-five hundred dollars was the price fixed by a Circuit Court Jury when it returned a verdict for damages against Vasiles I. Chibitchev, a Washington attorney. Mrs. Madeline McNamee Price, wife of a Jacksonville, Fla. real estate broker, and formerly Chibitchev's secretary, was the plaintiff. She alleged that the attorney forcibly kissed her at a Chicago hotel in 1925.
