Notice Sale Of County Notes

The commissioners of Person County offer for sale notes of Person County in the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars, said notes being issued in anticipation of the collection of road maintenance taxes, which have been levied for the current fiscal year.

One of said notes will be for the sum of two thousand dollars, will be dated September 4th, 1928, and will run for a period of seventy-five days.
