

FARM NOTES

In spite of the heavy rains last week, 6 field meetings were held on the farms of Messrs. W. A. Whitfield, D. S. Brooks, T. T. Mitchell, E. D. Morton, L. P. Sherman and J. O. Pearce.

Mr. W. A. Whitfield has a nice field of corn and soy beans growing in alternate rows, the rows being spaced 3 feet apart and the corn left a little thicker in the drill for the six ft. row than for the ordinary 4 ft. row. This gives the same number of stalks per acre and will not cut down the yield of corn while the beans are growing. Next year, the rows will be changed, the corn will be planted on the soy bean row after they have been turned under, and the beans will be planted on the corn row.

These beans will grow larger after the corn has reached maturity, they will add expensive nitrogen to the soil gathered from the air, and add humus to the soil so necessary for maintaining soil moisture over an ordinary dry spell. Messrs. L. P. Sherman and J. O. Pearce were other men visited this week who are trying this same system on their farms. In all, there are about twenty-five men who are trying this system, and if you are interested in making more corn per acre as you have always been betting while you are improving the land, and more after the first year, then you should by all means visit some of these men and adopt a similar system for next year and stick to it.

A few Mangum terraces were inspected by neighbors this week on the farms of Messrs. D. S. Brooks, T. T. Mitchell and J. O. Pearce. The first thing to do on the farm either before or after you set the title is to terrace it well as this will assist you materially in helping to hold the title. It is hard to keep up with the title, but Mangum terraces properly laid out, properly built and then properly maintained assists in holding the soil. They distribute the rainfall over each row more evenly by holding the water where needed on the high and dry places at the top of the hill, and at the same time prevent an over-abundance from flooding the land near the foot of the hills in the field, and, in many cases, causing the plants to drown.

Where the land is not too steep, three rows of crops are planted on the terrace, hence no land is taken up and lost. If the land is comparatively steep, then it will be best not to put but one row on top of the terrace. In this case, the terrace need not be over five or six feet wide, while the Mangum terrace is from ten to twelve feet wide.

Practically every farm in the county needs terracing. There should be at least ten sets of instruments in each township to take care of the needs, and they should be used after they are bought. In fact it is hard to get the cost from any piece of machinery unless it is used. Terracing has been done on one hundred farms the past two years, but this has not scratched the surface compared to the needs in the county. Very few terraces have been built along the highways, and there is a special need for more to be built where people traveling along the highway, from their farms, can see the terraces, thereby accounting the people with the system, and cause more to be built.

At the series of field meetings held this week, much interest was shown in the reports of 8-1-4 fertilizers on tobacco equipped with 8-2-5 and 8-4-6. On one field, there is considerable potato blight where the 8-2-5 is used, while the land where 8-4-6 is used, the potato blight has developed as yet.

Potato blight is identified by the edges of the leaf curling under creating a condition locally known as "rim bound" and the leaf "rot" badly around the edge and on the leaf. People who have this trouble should apply a little more potash to the land another year to correct this trouble.

No field meeting was held on the farms of Mr. E. E. Bradsher, but all of the tobacco is comparatively free from this trouble, they being but little of the disease on the plantation. He used 8-4-6 fertilizers and all of the land was limed.

Mr. E. D. Morton showed a group of neighbors this week a large field of tobacco that was limed last March. It was badly infested with Measurium fungus, called "bandworm" last year, but the tobacco shows no trouble from this source this year and the tobacco is fully fifty per cent better than it was last year, states Mr. Morton. While on the farm looking over the limed and unlimed land, Mr. Morton called our attention to a bunch of peas on the self feeder that was a striking demonstration of what feed will do for pigs. These pigs are now eleven weeks old, and are from a scrubby long rooter sow, and by the time that this gets to print and any one can get to see them, each one of these pigs will be as large as the old sow. The young pigs are very large and well developed, and have every indication of being as good as turebred pigs. Just another illustration of what feed will do.

Heavy rains presented a large attendance at the farm of Mr. L. P. Sherman to see the two year old Tappan breeding on the land for a corn crop in 1929.
