

**MARKET NOTES**

**Turkey Sale**

A turkey and poultry sale will be held at Roxboro Wednesday, November 20th. We are hoping that around three thousand dollars worth will be sold on this date. There is a ten per cent increase in the South in turkey production, and at present we do not know what the price will be, however, the prices will be published in next week's issue of The Courier if present plans are carried out.

While the price may not be as high as it should be, those having turkeys for sale will get cash for them at the truck without having to hunt for other markets, or picking the birds and shipping to the northern markets. If you can secure better prices locally, sell them locally, but as a rule the local market cannot absorb all offerings. This sale will take all offerings.

**Registered Calf and Heifer Meeting**  
Saturday 2:30 P. M.

We should not delay indefinitely bringing in another carload of registered calves and heifers. There are more than 68 prospects on the list wanting registered heifers or calves. Out of this number, there are certainly enough that could and should come to the meeting Saturday and sign on the dotted line for 25 head to be brought in. Details regarding prices, fees, and plans will be discussed at the meeting. If you are interested in seeing a registered Jersey come to your farm, be at the meeting whether you sign for one or not. Mr. Sanders will be through Ohio next week in the heart of a Jersey district, and if enough interest is shown, it will be a splendid opportunity to bring in a carload at the least expense.

Mr. Sanders will leave Roxboro Monday, Nov. 11th, to spend a few days at the meeting of American Society of Agronomists, Chicago, and on return trip, stop off and bring those heifers back with him that several of Person County farmers want. If you haven't the money, see your bankers. It is no disgrace to buy registered cattle on credit. They will increase in value every month if you will take the proper care of them.

If you have a boy that should be in the calf club, encourage him to put in an order for a registered calf. Do not pass the buck to the tobacco crop too strong, but make an effort to help put Person County along in the front rank with a little more good registered cattle.

Different aged calves will of course have different prices. Good calves will cost at 4 mos. of age around \$60 and expenses which should not average more than five dollars each from Ohio in carlots. Calves around six

months old will cost about \$75.00 to \$90.00, depending on the butter production of the dam. Heifers about a year old will cost from \$90.00 to \$120.00 and bred heifers will cost from an average of \$150.00 to \$175.00, depending on the butter production of the respective dams of the heifers. These prices are not so high, and one thing the county agent will do—if he cannot bring back a calf or heifer for the price you have indicated, having the desired individuality from good producing dams, your money will be brought back—your check will be returned. The cattle will be bought at the best price possible consistent with quality and individuality and at the least expense possible.

The cattle breeders will take me around to see the cattle in their cars free to you all. The county agent's expense would be very small in view of the fact that he will be through the state of Ohio at any rate. A railroad trip across about four counties will be all traveling expense necessary. The total expense of the county agent should not exceed 75 cents per head on a carload for two or three days in the field selecting them.

Let us have a good meeting Saturday at 2:30 P. M., at the courthouse to discuss this proposition further.

**A Few Things Done On Our Farm Program Of Work.**

While there is much to be done, we are proud of the record Person County farmers are making, and co-operation extended in the furtherance of the County Program of work. Up to Oct. 10th, 223 terracing demonstrations have been held, 1704 terrace lines ran on 1796 acres; 30 "V" terrace drags have been built by the agent, about 30 scoops bought for building up the low places, and 10 sets of Bostrum Brady terracing instruments have been brought in.

Eleven meetings held this year in interest of soybeans. Only five acres are reported in Frank Parker's report on soy bean acreage in 1927, and 474 in 1928. Thirty-eight men grew soy beans last year, and 57 men are on the list this year. One soy bean harvester has been brought into the county.

Ten meetings were held in interest of lespedeza; only two men sowed lespedeza before the program started, 42 men sowed last year, and 73 men seeded lespedeza in 1929; 8 harvesters have been placed.

Mr. E. G. Crews has unloaded a carload of limestone making this the fiftieth car since the program of work started.

Only two names were on the list in 1927 for higher grade fertilizers under tobacco, 20 men enlisted in 1928 and 90 men are using higher grades this year. About 320 farmers in all are practicing crop rotations with their land, though it is confidently felt

that more than this number are doing so.

We have brought in 22 registered Jersey bulls and 20 heifers. We need more than this number. Nineteen have started permanent pastures by spending some money for fertilizers, seed and limestone on their pastures.

We have 11 men in the county with more than 20 head of cattle on their farms, whereas only one or at least two had this many when the program of work started.

We have started a system of poultry marketing that has helped some for those who can produce eggs in 30 dozen lots per week, we are able to market the eggs at the best price without any trouble in New York.

Fifty-five self-feeders have been built on the program of work and the 56th one will be made for W. Y. Pass before this gets into print.

Three new farmers have started selling milk or cream, and one barn constructed for 40 cattle with concrete floors, mangers, stanchions, etc.

Several new poultry plants have been started with modern houses and standardbred poultry.
