Through Mistaken Idea Some Of The Depositors Are Holding Off

ALL MUST CO-OPERATE

When the question of reopening the First National Bank was discussed it was thought the real trouble would be in getting the stockholders to agree to make a donation of as much as one-third of the stock held, but it has turned out that the real trouble is in getting the depositors to agree leave their money on deposit for a term of four years, if that much time was necessary. Of course, if the bank does not open again the stockholders will suffer quite a loss, but they will not suffer alone, as the depositors will lose heavily.

The depositors can only get their money after the bills due, paper which is held by other banks, have been paid, as this paper is preferred. It is known by all at all familiar with the general condition of the bank that if liquidation is made by the receiver and collecloss to the bank, and the depositors can not possibly receive very much, while it is admitted on the other hand if the bank opens again and the notes collected by orderly process the depositors will receive hundred cents on the dollar for their deposits. Still, there are quite a number who are declining to sign the necessary paper agreeing to leave their money on deposit. This, we think, is poor judgment, and can only mean a loss to all concerned.

The opening of the bank depends on concerted action by every one interested, and if you think the bank will open anyway, whether you sign or not, you will probably wake up when it is too late, and take your loss along with those who tried to save you.
