

LEGALIZES BEER MAY 1

RALEIGH, N. C., April 4 .--Beer today was legalized in North Carolina effective May 1. The house passed the Francis bill on final reading after making minor changes in the measure and the senate concurred in all the amendments.

Senator Francis, introducer of the act legalizing sale of alcoholic beverages in the state for the first time since 1908, asked adoption of all the house changes. This was done without discussion.

The mere formality of ratification kept the bill from being a law of the state.
