use auction system. Considerable interest in the topacco exchange has been manifest MOTHER'S DAY with the announcement that a state-wide meeting to discuss the operation of the exchange probably will be held in Durham about the

middle of this month. Sponsors of the exchange claim that the present method of marketmiddleman, the manufacturer, exnew exchange will, for the first time, provide for the orderly marketing of this valuable crop.

Three major causes contribute, exchange sponsors say, to dissatisfaction at the open auction sales. They are variation of light in the warehouses; weather shifts which cause a quick change in the condition and appearance of the leaf; and the rapidity of sales with from 300 to 400 lots oftentimes going in an hour to the highest bidder.

Reduction Of Finnish Rate To Nominal Figure May Be Sign Of New Policy

FLAY TOKEN PAYMENTS

Washington, May 8 .- A new Finnish debt agreement, slashing its present high interest rate almost to the zero point, awaited President Reosevelt's approval today.

The draft, if satisfactory to the President, would give America's only paid-up-to-date debtor an interest rate of .03 percent as compared
