German Declared Guilty Of First Degree Murder; Sentenced To Die Mar. 18

Weary Jury Reports MOTHER AND SON

Its Findings To The Court After Nearly 12 Hours Of Constant Deliberation

Courtroom Tense As Foreman Reads **Fateful Decision** 

JUSTICE TRENCHARD, AFTER RECEIVING VERDICT, IMPOS-ES SENTENCE CARRYING CONDEMNED MAN TO CHAIR EARLY NEXT MONTH; REILLY SAYS HE WILL APPEAL TO HIGHEST COURT OF LAND: VERDICT ENDS NATION'S MOST SENSATIONAL TRIAL

Hunterdon County Courthouse Flemington, N. J., Feb. 13- Brune Richard Hauptmann was convicted tonight of America's most collossal crime, and he must forfeit his life in the electric chair for the murder of Baby Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.

Hauptmann is scheduled to b: executed March 18.

Only Three Voted For Life Sentence: Mrs. Hauptmann Scorns Wilentz

Flemington, N .J., Feb. 13-Bruno Richard Hauptmann, who heard his death sentence pronounced without an outward show of emotion, broke down and cried after being taken back to his cell, Warden Harry O. McCrea, of Hunterdon County jail, said tonight.

Flemington, N. J., Feb. 14-(Thursday)-The jury that doomed Burno Richard Hauptmann to death took five ballots, the Unit-Miss Doris Duke. Mrs. Cromwell ed Press learned tonight.

On the first ballot all 12 of the jurors voted a verdict of guilty, but three of them-Robert Cravatt, Miss Duke met her husband at reputed to be the richest girl in Rosie Pill and Verna Snyder-insisted on recommending life imprisonment rather than the death benalty.

Edward J. Reilly, chief defense counsel, announced immediately he would appeal "to the highest court in the land."

A jury that had searched for a verdict since 11:15 a. m. filed into the courtroom at 10:44 p. m., tonight and returned a verdict of "guilty as charged in the indictment,"

That verdict solved for all time so far as the State of New Jersey is concerned, the riddle of the Lindbergh crime, for the indictment charged that Hauptmann alone planned and executed the kidnapping that occurred, almost three years ago on the slope of Sourland Mountain, and that nowhere in the world are there any accomplices

#### High Tension

The courtroom was electric with tension as the jury, led by its scholarly foreman, Charles Walton, filed into the box. Hauptmann was sitting in the same seat he has occupied since the trial started, handcuffed to his guards.

Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, who has attended every session of the trial, was absent tonight.


