SALE OF AUTO LICENSES BY CLERKS OF SUPERIOR COURT HB 828. To make direct sales by the Revenue Department and Clerks of the Superior Court the exclusive method of distributing license plates for motor vehicles, the Clerks to receive 8c per plate and the Clerk's bonds to cover the money collected. CHANGING STATE SCHOOL on Finance. the school Commission so as to make the Governor honorary Chairman, uperintendent of Public Instrucon chairman, the five additional members of the Board of Education, and one person appointed by the Governor from each congressional district, members of the Commission. This Commission, as at present, could elect an Executive Secretary and would have the powers and duties heretofore conferred upon the State Board of Equilization and the State School Commission. The terms of the appointed members would be staggered; running from two to six years. 
