Education Board **Adopts Suggestion** For School Site

Recommendation Of Dr. High-Smith And Mr. Credle Is adopted By Board Sat.

LOCATION ON ROUTE 144

At a special session Saturday morning in the County Superintendent's office the Board of Education adopted the recommendation of Dr. J. Henry Highsmith and Mr. W. F. Credle as to the site of the proposed school building to be built in the western section of the county. Their recommendation was that it be located on Route No. 144 on the Roxboro-Prospect Hill highway and a short distance beyond Frank Whitfield's Store at Bushy Fork on what is known as the Bradsher property.

It is understood that the suggestion of these two men, who were sent out by the State School Commission, was to the effect that the building be located on this property which borders the highway on both sides and for that purpose fifteen acres be bought. The exact location of the building would be left in the hands of the architect.

Dr. Highsmith and Mr. Credle came up from Kaleigh to look over the proposed sites Wednesday at the request of interested parties and to make their recommendations as to the best location after all factors had been taken into consideration.
