chairman. In outlining plans for the drive in North Carolina, Mr. Goerch said today that he plans to enlist the cooperation of the various newspapers throughout North Carolina. In view of the fact that Will Rogers was so closely allied to the newspaper fraternity, Mr. Goerch said that it was both fitting and proper that the memhers of that profession should take the lead in this matter.

Local chairmen are being appointed and their names will be announced within a few days. Practically every bank in the state has expressed a willingness to serve as a depository for the Will Rogers Memorial Fund. Wholehearted cooperation on the part of the public generally is expected.

Will Rogers had hundreds of intimate friends in North Carolina and visited this state on numbers of occasions. Many thousands who never saw him were acquainted with him through his writings in over fifteen different newspapers in the state. 
