PROGRESS MADE BY CLUB

MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S CLUB

The Woman's Club held a very interesting and largely attended meeting yesterday afternoon at the Manufacturers club rooms. The various departments made reports as to the progress of their work, all of which were very encouraging. Gratification was expressed for the fact that the city authorities are co-operating with the civic department in the effort for cleanliness and health.

The Philanthropic department had charge of the program of the meeting. Mrs. F. E. Creelman explained the object of the work, and Mrs. Charles Ragan gave an account of the beginning of the organization. Miss Clara Cox told of the work that had been accomplished by the department, mentioning especially the distribution of new garments and second hand articles of clothing, also the plan on foot for circulation of periodicals and books. The importance of the work of our district nurse was also emphasized.

Miss Lucy Eshelman then favored the club with a beautiful solo. Miss Josephine Sneed, the district nurse, made a most interesting report, telling of her work and giving some instances of her experiences.

Miss Octola Lindsay recited most charmingly a pathetic recitation about a poor, crippled boy. Miss Iva Paylor read an appreciative paper on the life of Miss Frances Willard. Mrs. J. J. Jackson read a paper on Modern Philanthropy. She brought out the need of organized effort and the study of social problems. The main idea is to promote civilization by educating the people. Modern philanthropy goes deeper than occasional charity. She gave instances of betterment work in New York and Iowa, telling especially of the work of Jane Adams.

Mrs. T. J. Gold rendered a solo most charmingly. Mrs. Creelman spoke of settlement house work and ventured the prophecy that the time will come when such a work will be undertaken in High Point. Miss Anveta Lindsay gave a brief account of the meeting of the Woman's Club in Greensboro during the time of the Tuberculosis Convention. Refreshments consisting of wafers and chocolate, were served.

CAUGHT IN AN APRIL SHOWER WITHOUT AN UMBRELLA

I may say that the postal shower planned struck me squarely without an umbrella or any other protection from its onsets. J. L. KING IS ON TRIAL.

The John L. King case in which the defendant is charged with allegedly dealing with the county board of highway commissioners while a member of that body was called in Superior court just before adjournment yesterday but before the court closed for the day the evidence had been concluded. The jury sitting on the case, with one exception, is the same as has been on duty all the week and is composed of the following: T. H. R. Whitsett, Stephen Earl, N. A. Ballinger, S. C. Dalton, J. H. Ridd, J. P. Payne, P. C. Summers, Dan Summers, M. O. Willard, John N. Little, J. L. Blair and J. R. Osborn.

The argument was concluded in the King case today at 11 o'clock. The judge ordered counsel to get together and agree as to the facts. This looks as if the jury will be charged to bring in a special verdict. The attorneys have not agreed as to the facts in the case as yet.

Wade Coble Arraigned.

Yesterday morning Wade Coble was arraigned on the charge of the murder of John M. Staley. His father and mother, Joe and Etta Coble are in the same hall of confinement, being charged as accessories after the fact. A special venire of 100 was ordered and the trial set for today County Attorney John N. Wilson will assist Solicitor Gattis in the prosecution. The defendants are represented by Messrs. John A. Barringer and Bradshaw and Sherrod.

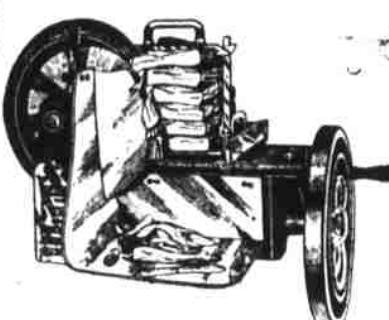
