## The General Assembly

Raleigh, Jan. 18.—In the General Assembly yesterday the bill creating the commission plan of government for Greensboro was ratified in both the house and senate and the bill becomes law. Subject to ratification by the qualified voters of that city.

Senator Holbrook, of Guilford, in the Senate stated that in drafting the bill for a commission form of government for Greensboro by oversight no provision was made for registration for the ratification election to be held by the voters February 7, and he offered a bill remedying the defect, providing for the books to be open to days. The bill passed its readings and was ordered sent to the house without engrossment.

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 18.—The Piedmont county delegation was augmented today by the arrival of a strong delegation from Trinity township who are enthusiastic supporters of the movement. The situation is getting more favorable every day as the members are informed of the true situation.

There has been a number of misstatements by the opponents of the new county because they had not informed themselves on the proposition. The advocates of the new county have answered these statements so effectively that the opponents are seeing the necessity of taking another tact. This came out last night when a letter was sent from Greensboro advising a change in the manner of attack, their fairest arguments have practically been abandoned down here. A bill was introduced today in the House to provide a home for the widows of the Confederates.

## PIEDMONT COUNTY

PIEDMONT COUNTY HEARING ON JANUARY 31

The House and Senate Committees on Counties, Cities and Towns yesterday afternoon fixed Tuesday, January 31st, as the date for hearing the argument and evidence for and against the creation of the county of Piedmont out of portions of Guilford, Randolph and Davidson counties, with High Point as the county seat.

The House Committee first fixed January 31st as the date for the hearing of Senator Holbrook and Representative Kirkman of Guilford. Later, Mr. Walter Murphy, in behalf of the new county advocates, asked to have the date moved up to January 24th, with the understanding that unless the Senate committee fixed the date it should be on the 31st. Before the Senate committee Governor Aycock, for the new county, pleaded for an earlier date than January 31st, which Senator Holbrook insisted on. The committee fixed January 31st, and on that date both committees will hold the case.

Whatever else may be said for High Point Enterprise making a clean fight for the establishment of Piedmont county—Greensboro News.

## For a State Board of Trade

TO INTRODUCE A BILL FOR CREATION OF STATE BOARD OF TRADE

It is understood that a bill will be introduced in the house to create a state board of trade, to be known as the State Board of Trade, to be composed of representatives from the various industries of the state, to be appointed by the governor, and to be organized on or before the 1st day of February next.

The state board of trade would have the same powers as the state board of agriculture, and would be organized on or before the 1st day of February next.

All of the major and minor industries of the state would be represented on the board, and the board would have the power to investigate and report on the various industries of the state, and to make recommendations to the governor on the subject of the regulation of the same.

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### W. O. T. CLUB

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### A NEW GAME LAW

We are rather inclined to believe that the bill introduced by Representative Dillard of Cherokee county, for the protection of fish and game in this State would prove a more effective law than any the State has yet had.

The bill provides for the appointment of three members to the Game and Fish Commission, to be appointed by the Governor, taking the place of the State Audubon Society. It is understood that the Audubon Society officials will not oppose it.

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### A NEW BANK

Rutherfordton, Jan. 18.—The Peoples Bank of Union Mills, with a paid capital of \$50,000, will begin business on Monday next. The bank will have a deposit of \$10,000 for the first day.

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### TRUSTEES RECOMMENDS HALF MILLION FOR UNIVERSITY.

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—The trustees of the University of North Carolina in annual session yesterday received the report of President Young and that of the committee on memorializing the General Assembly, the principal feature of public interest in which was the recommendation that the University be in special need of increased income and additional buildings, the additional income needed being estimated at \$250,000 and the additional buildings to put the institution on proper footing at \$500,000.

### HEARING POSTPONED

In United States bankruptcy court yesterday the hearing in the case of S. Bryer and S. G. Neal, and agent John Peterson, a bankrupt, were held, some tax accounts were examined until February 10. The debtors are encouraged with the knowledge that they will be able to pay their debts in a few days.

### BIG LUMBER TRADE IS MADE AT WHITEVILLE

Whiteville, Jan. 17.—One of the largest timber deals ever consummated in this section of the State has been effected by which the Whiteville Lumber Company has purchased the principal mill at Whiteville, N. C., which the mill requires fifty acres of land and 500,000 feet of timber on the Cape Fear Lumber Company. The latter concern going out of business and the valuable one of the Whiteville plant was purchased a few days ago by the Atlantic Coast Lumber Company. The price paid for the timber was \$125,000.

### MILLERS WILL APPEAL TO LEGISLATURE FOR RELIEF

Raleigh, Jan. 18.—There was a conference yesterday between the legislative committee of the North Carolina Millers' Association and a committee of Agriculture W. A. Graham, in which the millers appealed to the commission to acquiesce in their demand for the repeal of the state law for the stamp tax on feed-stuffs of 20 cents per ton, putting North Carolina as they insist upon a footing with all the other progressive states of the union in this matter. Now that the commissioner of agriculture and the state board of agriculture refuse to agree to the elimination of this section of the feed-stuffs law, the millers declare their purpose to have the bill introduced and attempt to carry it through the general assembly, anyway. Here for the millers were Capt. J. D. McNeill, Fayetteville; A. B. Honey, High Point; G. T. Cornwell, High Point; F. A. Sherrill, Statesville; W. M. Reed, Durham.
