COUNTY COURT FOR GUILFORD.

Raleigh, March 6.—Tonight the Holgood bill extending the jurisdiction of the Municipal Court to Greensboro to cover the entire county, High Court excepted, passed both Senate and House and was enrolled for ratification. The bill empowers the court with civil and criminal jurisdiction. Senator Holgood offered a bill providing for the nomination of state officers and United States senators by a State primary. It was referred to a committee and may be called tomorrow.

TWO LIVES LOST IN EARLY MORNING FIRE AT LAKEVIEW.

Lakeview, March 6.—The lives of two guests were lost and a number of others were more or less seriously injured in an early morning fire which destroyed the Loch Crystal hotel, a tourists' hostelry recently completed here. The dead are:

Miss Anna M. Barnes, of New York and Mrs. G. C. Pettis, of New Haven, Conn.

The fire was discovered about 5 o'clock this morning and the flames spread through the large frame building so rapidly that it was immediately apparent that the structure was doomed. The only thought was to save the lives of the twenty-five guests stopping in the hotel, the success of which efforts are told in the above paragraph. In a very short time the beautiful little hotel, the erection of which added no little to the advantages of Lakeview as a year-round resort, was nothing more than a mass of smoking ruins.

Miss Anna M. Barnes of New York was on the third floor and it was due to this fact that all efforts to effect her rescue proved of no avail. The rapid headway made by the flames cut off all means of communication with this floor. The charred remains of Miss Barnes were taken from the ruins this afternoon, the position of the remains indicating that she had gotten out of her room and was making an effort to escape by way of the stairs when overtaken by the flames. Little remained of her except the charred bones.

DAVIDSON LEAVES THE BOARD.

Chairman J. A. Davidson's resignation offered some time ago was accepted yesterday, when the county commissioners met in regular session. Mr. W. C. Tucker read a letter from Chairman Davidson in which his resignation as a commissioner was set forth. Mr. Davidson stated that a pressure of private business made the step necessary; that he could not attend to his private business and devote to the official business which he could not give the time the office demanded. It is understood that Cyrus A. Wharton, of the eastern part of the county, will be the appointee. When seen yesterday afternoon Mr. Forbes would not say whom he had decided upon. However, it is known that T. A. Wilson, C. J. Sockwell and Cyrus A. Wharton were the men most prominently mentioned and it is believed that Mr. Wharton will be the appointee.
