### AS TO SUPERINTENDENT OF HEALTH

The most important and far-reaching thing done by any local county commissioners in North Carolina during this generation was done yesterday in the city of Greensboro. Because superstition and the lack of a spirit of amity between the two commissioners of agriculture, poverty and disease, the day when you bear in mind your commissioners agree with your board of education, it were an eminent teaching force to give instructions in agriculture, domestic science and hygiene to the people and school children of this county at our public school buildings, they to that act positively declared war against poverty, incapacity, crime, superstition, disease and death. It is no more reasonable than to think that the enemies of man. There is no excuse for extreme materialism in this movement, for the divine message hath pointed out the way when he prepared man to teach agriculture, opposed superstition and educate ignorant and unwise, against the sick and caused the hand of Death. The well of the Temple is rent it to an end, we never hear an open mind we enter in to study the sacred trees of God concerning disease, the home and agriculture. Observed is the God's creation and the laws which the scientists have discovered concerning disease, agriculture and home life are therefore the laws of God.

When all of our people are taught the real nature and causes of disease and lantern slides and gross and microscopic specimens are used to demonstrate the truth, of this teaching then they will be free and within three years more than one third of the sickness we now have in this country will be prevented. The prevention of disease is a great and alluring subject and the practicalities of the proposition is admitted throughout the entire civilized world. In many places much has already been accomplished in the way of disease prevention, the Panama Canal zone has been made as healthy as High Point, yellow fever has been driven out of Havana, bubonic plague has been kept from gaining a foot hold on our Pacific coast, the cities of Washington and New York have in the last eight years been able to prevent one half of the usual summer sickness and death among infants, England and the state of New York have made a reduction of over forty per cent in the morbidity and death from tuberculosis, in the German empire small pox has been practically abolished and Japan during her recent war with Russia was able to prevent more than sixty per cent of the usual sickness and death therefrom in time of war, in the last twenty years the kingdom of Sweden has increased average length of human life from thirty eight years
