DEPENDENT UPON THE TONE OF THE ELECTORATE

There is today an increasing and ever expanding movement toward compact and concentrated forms of city government, with swift and direct responsibility of officials to the people, all of which has come about because of the successful trial of modern methods.

Commission government, which gives large powers to a small body of men and makes them directly and immediately answerable for their acts, will be tried increasingly among American cities in the next decade. It is no panacea for every ill, nor does such a nostrum exist anywhere. But the feature of the recall system, we believe is too radical. Like most radicalism in government, it has a side which may bring unfortunate results. The easiness with which a recall election may be secured invites abuse. Demagogues or sensational newspapers might raise the hue and cry whenever their individual preferences have not been met, circulating petitions, forcing elections and retarding the administration of government till the thing has become a nuisance. Where parties are closely matched, the "outs" can seize and exploit the recall as a handy pretext for giving their candidate another chance. Here it depends upon the temper and tone of the electorate. The recall can rise no higher than its source; it is not magically immune from distortion or abuse; it will be useful or the contrary according to the character of the community.

SOUTH'S SACRIFICE FOR GOOD OF NATION

Speaking of the advertisement of the South through the "Back Home" movement, there is a reason why it will be effective. For generations the South has been sending her sons and daughters into the other three corners of this nation, there to make their homes, and contribute not only to the upbuilding of those regions, but to inject into these sections the best blood and the highest ideals of our civilization. We of the South may now distinguish in this movement which has so long shown no compensating features, the hand of a wise providence. Let us believe that first of all the South has been permitted to remain undefiled by foreign immigration and strange ideals that it might preserve throughout the years those fundamental principles upon which our nation was established and send out into the new civilization of the west men whose ideals were formed in a section where the home is sacred and the religion of the Father is founded on the simple faith in the word of God. Such men have gone out from the South and their blood, their courage, and their ideals, have been saving graces that have had their influence throughout the nation. Let us believe, we say, that this has been part of the South's mission in the years that have flown. Let us hope the South's sacrifice has been for the good of our nation.

Today the west has been developed. That wonderful region in which all Americans take a pride has come into its own, while the South, through her contribution of men to that section, suffers—we may truthfully say—from the loss of blood given to build up that region. But this state of affairs is not without its advantages if we but see them and take hold of the opportunities offered. No region of all this country has so many sons away from home. They crowd the west, but in the heart of each there is the tenderest affection and the most glowing pride in the section that gave them birth.

THE BIG ISSUE OF VARACITY

Without comparison the celebrated Lorimer case now on—has developed the varacity issue to a greater extent than any previous political trial of such importance—and especially where United States Senators, Congressmen and Governors—to say nothing of the many common every day millionaires, who have figured in its proceedings. The absolute contradiction, of sworn testimony is an every day occurrence. While the various allegations are denied with as much a systematic procedure as a rapid fire army gun, and a desparaging feature of the trial is that the Senate committee at the close of each day's work of probing finds itself in a different port. Through it all Mr. Edward Hines shows up a remarkable figure. He accuses Mr. Taft outright with a knowledge of the corruption of Lorimer's election, which the President denies.
