SOCIOLOGICAL CONGRESS.

There is so much thought expended on war, politics, storms and floods that the more permanent things of life are being neglected by all save a few, and this is true of the Southern Sociological Congress that meets in Atlanta on April 25-29. This congress is composed of six departments—public health, courts and prisons, child welfare, organized charities, negro problem, the church and social service.

The congress stands for and is working for the following objects:

For the abolition of convict lease and contract systems, and for the adoption of modern principles of prison reform.

For the extension and improvement of juvenile courts and juvenile reformatories.

For the proper care and treatment of defectives—the blind, the deaf, the insane, the epileptic and the feeble-minded.

For the recognition of the relation of alcoholism to disease, to crime, to pauperism and to vice, and for the adoption of appropriate preventive measures.

For the adoption of uniform laws of the highest standards concerning marriage and divorce.

For the adoption of the uniform law on vital statistics.

For the abolition of child labor by the enactment of the uniform child labor law.

For the enactment of school attendance laws, that the reproach of the reatest degree of illiteracy may be removed from our section.

For the suppression of prostitution.

For the solving of the race question in a spirit of helpfulness to the negro and of equal justice to both races.

For the closest co-operation between the church and all society agencies for the securing of these results.

Ninety-six of the leading thinkers and social workers of this country will be present during the session of this congress, and a presentation an exchange of their ideas will prove of great benefit. No one individual knows it all, but each can contribute something to the various problems and the aggregate will be a valuable asset.

QUESTION OF WORRY

The turtle never worries. He lives, it is said, in some parts of the earth, for a thousand years, or very nearly that long, and maybe longer.

That may be a good thing for the turtle. His only discovered purpose is to continue to exist. But animals that worry live more in a minute than the turtle does in his thousand years. "Worry kills," they say. If it

You could spit on him, and he would smile back. You could kick him, and he would draw more closely within himself and say nothing. All he wants is to live.

But the successful man wants to worry, and he does. Worry is the best expression of mental activity. It is the reflection of dissatisfaction with one's shortcomings or conditions. It is the first incentive to improvement. It is the first step toward resolve and effort.

Worrying over trifles is foolish. Worrying other people with your worries is pernicious. You can make life miserable for yourself with the one, and for everybody who knows you with the other.
