For the abolition of child labor by the enactment of the uniform child labor law,

For the enactment of school attendance laws, that the reproach of the reatest degree of illiteracy may be removed from our section.

For the suupression of prostitution.

For the solving of the race question in a spirit of helpfulness to the negro and of equal justice to both races.

For the closest co-operation between the church and all society agencies for the securing of these results.
