Washington, May 19 .- The There being no nomination in eclipse of the sun on August 21 next-total in part of Europe and the first Democratic primary for partial in northeastern Americais attracting widespread attention of astronomers and scientists, various expeditions being arranged to witness this phenomena. Prof. C. C. Abbott, head of the

astronomical branch of the Smithsonian Institution, and a recognized authority on solar phenomena, gives the following popular account of the eclipsee.

On August 21, 1914, the moon will pass exacty between the earth and the sun, and there will be a total solar eclipse. It will not be observed in America, except as a small partial eclipse at sunrise in the Northern States and Canada, but in Persia, Russis and Scandinavia the full effect will be seen.

Dominican Defiance Disturbs Washington

Fighting Reported by Commander Bierer of Gunboat Wheeling.

Washington, May 19 .- News oday of the latest activties of Dominican revolutionists caused no every respect; their coal chute little concern among State and Navy officials here. Commander Bierer of the gunboat Wheeling at Santo Domingo City, reported the rebels had defied American officers in charge of a custom house near Comendaodr and forced 50,000 rounds of ammunition across the border from Hayti,

At Dajabon, also on the Haitian ine, the commander reported General Dorcilien, with 300 or 400 men, had threatend to attack the custom house, and the situation there is ocnsidered acute. President Bordas is continuing his attack on the rebel stronghold. Puerta Plata, and small revolu-

donary bands are operating in the vicinity of Santo Domingo City itself. On the night of May 14. he report said, rebels fired about 50 shots across the river at the apital and disappeared.
