DYING BABY COOS AND LAUGHS WHEN CRUSHED BY AUTO

Mother Saves Three Other Children, But is Badly Mangled Herself So Doing.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—John Ruf, eighteen months old, Jersey City, showed a score of persons what real grit is. He sat in the middle of a road in Bayonne after an automobile accident, and smiled, although his left leg was torn to shreds.

Placed in another machine, he cooed and smiled all the way to Bayonne hospital. He died a few minutes later, but not before many persons had wondered at his bravery. His mother, Mrs. Catherine Ruf, thirty-five, is dying in the same hospital.

Mrs. Ruf, accompanied by three of her neighbor's children, attempted to cross the street. She was carrying baby John in her arms and had one of the other children by a hand. An automobile owned and driven by Mrs. Margaret Kiver, forty, Bayonne, appeared. Mrs. Ruf pushed the three children to safety but the machine struck her and the baby.

Mrs. Kiver, after treatment for cuts on the face, was arrested on a charge of homicide.

BODY OF WOMAN FOUND IN HOTEL IN KANSAS CITY

Poison Believed to Have Been Taken, But Motive is Not Known to Police.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 18.—Bodily decomposed body of a young woman was found in a room at the Hotel Emery on East Ninth street. The woman, apparently about 26 years of age, had registered at the hotel in April as Mrs. Q. F. Yoder, but letters found in her possession were addressed to Miss Mary Clements. She had been dead two days. The woman is believed to have taken poison. Letters were found in the room from Sgt. W. F. Yoder, formerly at Camp Funston, Kan., but later transferred to Camp Beauregard, La. She is believed to have been employed here as a cigar clerk. No motive is known for her death.
