CITY MISSIONARY UNION HOLDS A MEETING

The city Baptist Missionary Union which was recently organized held its third meeting last night at the Southside Baptist church.

The meeting opened with devotional exercises in charge of Rev. Miller, pastor of the Southside church, after which a short business program was carried out. The most important business transacted was the election of a nominating committee, Mrs. C. F. Weeden of the First Baptist church, chairman; Mrs. D. I. Andrews, of Green Street church; Mrs. Apple, Southside; and Mrs. Welborn, Mechanicville. Of special interest to members of the union was a report from the Winston-Salem Baptist hospital. The committee reported that \$200 had been raised for the furnishing of one room, and a brass plate bearing the inscription "Woman's Missionary Union of High Point" has been placed over the door of this room.

Mrs. George Green, who is in charge of the Woman's Training school at Canton, China, gave a very interesting account of her work there. She said that one of the greatest difficulties she encountered was in learning the Chinese language, since it required exactly two years, at the rate of from five to eight hours a day devoted to the study. When the school first opened Mrs. Green stated there were eight scholars, but in 1921 the attendance had increased to 117. Now there are 60 classes doing Christian work.

Mrs. Green will speak again at the Green Street Baptist church, Sunday evening at 7:30. A special B. Y. P. U. program will be carried out at this time.

CLUB WOMEN MEET AT PINEHURST

Pinehurst will be the mecca for club women on the 5th, 6th and 7th of this month when the southeastern council of federated women's clubs and the state council meet in the third convention of federated club women.

A delightful musical program has been arranged for the evening session when prominent men and women will be heard in short addresses to the convention.

Thursday afternoon will be taken up by the North Carolina council meeting at which time reports from the various departments will be heard. A feature of this session will be an address by Dr. Della Dixon Carroll, of Raleigh.

Four addresses will feature the evening session. After a round table discussion led by Mrs. J. E. Hayes, of Georgia, the convention will adjourn.

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


