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SOMETHING REMARKABLE will certainly happen about next November, and soon thereafter, for Mr. WATKINS, son of the Courier Journal, says:

"It is possible for the Republican party to have men within its grasp to nominate G. Blaine in the White House and make John A. Logan the pending offer of the Senate, the time for the dissolution of the Democratic party has come."

Now which will it be, the inauguration of a Democratic President, or a dissolution of the Democratic party?

It has been pretty generally circulated by the Democratic papers in the State, that WASHINGTON DUKES, the nominee for State Treasurer on the Liberal Republican ticket had declined the nomination. We have not seen his letter of declination yet, but his name is published in the Republican papers as the candidate. In the meantime Mr. DUKE has received many compliments from the Democratic press, and after all who he finds out what a nice fellow the Democrats think he is, he may conclude to stick.

An "Inquiring Democrat" of New York addresses a letter to the Sun and pertinently asks who "the Hon. ROSWELL P. FLOWER is," and very properly adds:

"A man so prominently spoken of in connection with the Democratic nomination and particularly in the coming canvass, when his nominee will be subjected to the closest scrutiny by the dissident in the opposite party, must surely be a person whom his popularity is great."

Mr. FLOWER's popularity is very likely confined to his Congressional district. Will the Democrats suffer themselves to be defeated again by a New York blunder?

The Democratic Convention held at the court house on Saturday was harmonious and a good delegation appointed to the State convention. The remarks made by Hon. C. C. CLARK on offering the resolutions instructing the delegates to use every effort to have Maj. JOHN HUNTER nominated for Lieutenant-Governor and JOHN S. LONG for Superintendent of Public Instruction were full of patriotic sentiment, and will have a tendency to head up discord and present a united front in November next. F. M. SIMMONS, Esq., also made a vigorous speech, in which he pronounced the Democratic outlook as brighter than for many years.

**THE OTHER SIDE.**  
We have shown in a former issue something of the discontent among the Republicans, by quoting from a number of their leading papers, in regard to the nomination of BLAINE, but it will be well for the Democrats not to flatter themselves that they will have a "walk over" in November next on account of the divisions in the ranks of their opponents. Dispatches were sent from many points in the New England States, New York and the Pacific coast giving account of the widest enthusiasm, ratification meetings, booming of cannon, suspension of business, forming clubs, etc.

BLAINE's nomination will be enthusiastically endorsed by those who still keep green in their memories the prejudices engendered by the civil war. BLAINE's tactics will be to array the Solid North against the Solid South, and if he succeeds in this we may expect to chronicle the same results that we have for the last twenty-four years.

The Democratic papers welcome BLAINE as the candidate, because they claim that he is an easy man to beat. Whether this be true or not, the good citizen who desires the peace and prosperity of the whole country more than party, will regret to see any man nominated for the high office of President of these United States whose chances of election will depend upon his ability to arouse sectional prejudices, and open afresh the wounds that have been slowly but steadily healing for a number of years. All great questions of governmental policy—finances, tariff, internal revenue, civil service reform, and to education, etc., will be lost sight of when BLAINE gives out the command, "Vote as you shot." The Danville and Corinth investigations have been inaugurated and conducted for the purpose of enforcing the importance of this command. And BLAINE knows that when the ranks begin to close up this old command will have the same effect in arousing the Solid North that it had in '68 and '72. He is intensely popular with those who still hate the South, and will make a vigorous canvas upon the old sections.
