PHOSPHATES.

FROM DR. DANSEY'S REPORT. The special feature of the work of the Experiment Station during the last two years is the phosphate investigation, and the discovery of workable beds of this important mineral is the most significant occurrence in the material development of the State.

The honor of the State is the phosphate survey in its report, and it will be necessary to give any details here. The report of the Engineer and the Chemist published in a few days.
