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THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

February 23, 1885.

The Senate met at 10 o'clock, Lieut. Gov. Stedman in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Marshall.

Among the bills introduced were the following: To amend chapter 30 of the Code, relative to the drainage of lowlands to aid in the navigation of New River, Stump sound and other waters; to amend chapter 148, laws of 1883, relative to local assessments for school purposes.

Mr. Gidger, of the committee on education, reported favorably on the bill for the maintenance of the University. The bill was made the special order for Wednesday at 11 o'clock.

The following bills passed third reading: Concerning obscene literature, House substitute; concerning trustees and declaratory of the meaning of so much of chapter 204, of the laws of 1884, as relates to survivorship in an estate in joint tenancy; appropriating \$5,000 additional to the Oxford Orphan Asylum, to allow the city of New Bern to assume bonds to prevent selling or giving intoxicating liquors to inmates of penal or charitable institutions (substitute adopted); to amend section 1739 of the Code, in regard to drawing up, to incorporate the Christian Brotherhood of Norfolk, Va.; to amend section 1800, of the Code, to enable justices of the peace to issue warrants for the protection of crops; to permit counter-claims in application for continuance.

SENATE—NIGHT SESSION. A bill was introduced to incorporate the "Confederate Home Association."

The following bills passed third reading: For the relief of sheriffs and tax collectors, to incorporate the bank of New Bern; to amend chapter 5, private laws 1881; (resolution allowing convicts to the exposition company for the purpose of pulling down the exposition building).

HOUSE. The House met at 10 o'clock, Speaker Holt in the chair. The following bills passed third reading: To amend the charter of New Bern, (limits the rate of taxation on polls to \$1.80, and on property to—); to incorporate the S. H. Gray manufacturing company; to protect children abandoned by their parents; to require judges to allow juries to take written instructions with them on their retirement; to amend the law relating to diamond-back terrapins.

The following bills passed third reading: To give a stock law for Vance, Granville, Lincoln and Person counties; for the support of the institution for the deaf, dumb and blind; to make it unlawful for physicians to disclose information lawfully given them by their patients; to authorize the commissioners of Jackson county to pay certain school bills.

SENATOR VANCE.

His Address, Delivered at Baltimore, Monday, Feb. 23, 1885.

Senator Z. B. Vance, Monday evening, delivered an address before the Confederate Maryland Line Association on "The Last Days of the War in North Carolina."

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WASHINGTON NEWS AND NOTES.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23, 1885.

The dedication of the Washington monument on Saturday last was a memorable affair. It was a National event, and I may say the whole nation united in expression of joy and gratitude over the completion of the memorial for the heroine brought to the Capitol military and civic organizations from every part of the country. It is a consummation which, ten years ago seemed not likely to occur during the present century.

The speaker said the first consummation of the program was admirably carried out. Both at the monument and at the Capitol, the monument presented a splendid appearance on the smooth, cleanly swept floor of Pennsylvania Avenue, and a fine military band of 100 men was seen, even in this city of memorable pageants. At the head of the line, mounted on a fine black horse, and enveloped in a large military cloak, rode the General in Chief, Sherman.
