THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The Senate met at 10:30, Lieutenant-Governor Stedman in the chair. The following bills passed third reading: To amend the charter of Warsaw, Duplin county; to establish a new township in Yancey county.

The General Assembly adjourned Monday, March 9th, at 6 a. m. to protect fish. The following bills passed third reading: To authorize commissioners of Hyde to pay certain claims to inhabitant of the District school, Lenoir county; to prohibit the taking of oysters from certain creeks in Hyde county.

The bill to establish a tax commission was made the special order for Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock. HOUSE. At 10:30 the House met, Mr. Glenn in the chair.

The following were among the bills introduced: For the relief of the cotton and grain exchange in New Bern; to promote oyster farming; for the relief of the sheriff of Craven county; to incorporate the Albemarle and Currituck Steam Navigation Company.

The contested election case from Caswell, being the special order, came up in a resolution that Mr. Corbett was elected and was entitled to the seat. The resolution was adopted, and Morris N. Corbett, the representative from Caswell, county, came forward and took the oath of office.

SENATE. TUESDAY, March 3. At 10:20 Lieutenant-Governor Stedman called the Senate to order. Mr. Kennedy presented a petition from citizens of Wayne, Duplin and Craven counties, for a new county, to be called Jarvis.
