## TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES.

We had in the Union Congress call for a meeting of the legislatures of S. C. and N. C. to assemble a "Snow Hill on Saturday, the 16th of May," for the purpose of taking steps to build a road from Wilson to Kinston, via Stantonburg, Snow Hill and Hockerton. The proposed line would pass through a fine country and give the farmers of the two states quick and cheap transportation for their products.

We say cheap transportation, but this depends upon who controls the road. If the farmers and merchants interested in the project build it and operate it as an independent local road they can secure cheap through rates, because the A. & S. C. R. R. would bid for their freights at Kinston and the W. & W. at Wilson. But in this event they cannot hope for a dividend on the capital invested. Their profit must arise from increased value of lands and town property which will necessarily follow rapid transit facilities.

We would not say one word, if we knew it, to discourage this enterprise we would like to see the time come when a railroad will cross every county in the State, especially in this Eastern section of ours. But experience proves that short lines of railway do not disappear.
