EDITORIAL NOTES.

CABINET making continues brisk
in the East. In the West all is
quiet.
GEN. W. P. ROBERTS has been
suggested for Adjutant General of
North Carolina.

Senate rejected the bill to establish
a home for disabled Confederate
soldiers and sailors.
Stocks are down in New York
which is usually the case near the
time for changing the admistration
of the government.
GEN. HARRISON will neither
affirm or deny the report that he
has offered the Secretaryship of
State to Mr. Blaine.

REV. JAMES P. BOYCE, D. D.,
President of the Southern Baptist
Theological Seminary at Louisville,
Ky., is dangerously ill in Paris.
The Durham Recorder would
like to see Hon. Melvin E. Carter,
of Asheville, elected Speaker of the
next House of Representatives.
GOVERNOR GRAY of Indiana has
been notified by Prosecutor Coydon
that forty White Caps, mostly well
to do farmers have been indicted.
The New York Herald announces
that Hayti proposes to outfit as
by returning the Haytian Republic
before our vessels get to their des-
tination.
M. DE LESSERS and his col-
leagues in the Panama Canal Com-
pany have resigned and the affairs
of their enterprise seem to have
gone to the wall.

As heretofore stated, Mr. A.
Leazar, of Iredell, is a candidate
for Speaker of the next House.
Capt. C. M. Cook and Major M. E.
Carter are his opponents.
THE World's Indianapolis special
says that Gen. Harrison has ac-
cidentally left fall his opinion that
there will be an extra session of
the Fifty-first Congress.
THE President has nominated
E. Hartbridge, of Jacksonville, Fla.,
to be U. S. District Judge for the
Northern District of Florida in place
of the late Thomas Settle.

OWING to fears that the Panama
Canal Company's difficulties may
give rise to disorders on the Isth-
mus, the French government has
sent a man of war to Colon to pro-
tect French interests.

THE Wilmington Messenger says:
The corner stone of the Good
Samaritan Hospital for colored people
was laid at Charlotte last
Tuesday. The building of this hos-
pital has been undertaken by white
persons entirely, and is under the
auspices of the Episcopal Church.
THE President has accepted the
resignation of Sellers and nomi-
nated Leon O. Bailey to be United
States Attorney for Indiana in his
place. Bailey was Sellers' assistant
and is familiar with the Dudley
case, and all other cases in which
bribery is charged.
EX-GOVERNOR JARVIS, present
U. S. Minister to Brazil, is at home
on a sixty days' leave of absence.
He has not resigned the Brazilian
mission, but it is supposed that he
will do so and become a candidate
for the office of United States Sen-
ator from North Carolina.
BIRMINGHAM manufacturers
have issued an address to President-
elect Harrison in which they set
forth that the political parties in
the South can now divide on polit-
ical issues, and ask General Harri-
son to recognize the best element
of the Republican party in making
appointments in the South.
It having been rumored that
Harrison will assemble Congress
in session soon after inauguration,
the question arises, "What for?"
If an extra session shall be called
its purpose will no doubt be to
strengthen the party by admitting
new States, and by securing with-
out delay the organization and
patronage of the House.

THE White Cap organizations in
Ohio have all been acting under
charters taken out from the office
of the Secretary of State under a
variety of names, such as "Brothers
of Industry" and "Knights of
Liberty and Law." On last Satur-
day Gov. Foraker issued a procla-
mation annulling all these charters,
and saying that in case of any
further terrorizing, whipping or
threatening the members of these
organizations would be held re-
sponsible.

EDUCATION.
THE JOURNAL under its humble
effort with the masterful endeavor
of the Wilmington Star in behalf
of education in North Carolina.
"Let us have more and better
education in North Carolina," says
the Star, and the JOURNAL echoes
the sentiment.
There is an opinion prevalent
in some quarters, that education is
no benefit to certain classes.
That depends on the kind of
education. The whole thing must
be properly educated. If the in-
tellectual faculties are trained and
the moral sensibilities ignored, the
man becomes an accomplished
knave, and intelligence is made the
auxiliary of evil and the associate
of vice; but if by the mind and
heart are dominated and illumined
and immanulate truth man is en-
nobled and the world made better.
North Carolina has most honor-
ably met the demand of common
school education. Perhaps no
State has done more, according to

means and opportunity, to place
common schools in its early reach
of all her children, than this grand old
commonwealth. But we would
have her essay a loftier flight and
place the State University in the
fore front of the educational in-
stitutions of the day. Far be it from
us to detract from the growing
fame of this venerable college. Its
foundations were laid in wisdom
and sacred truth goes forth from
all its portals. Let the treasures
of science and the wealth of letters
be the possession of all the sons of
North Carolina; then will knowl-
edge cover the land as with a
shield, and liberty find its strong-
est bulwark in the intelligence and
virtue of the people.

HOW IS IT?
Is the world getting worse? Is
civilization and Christianity losing
their influence? Not at all. Every-
day lifts us higher in the scale of
being and brings us nearer to God.
How is it then that wickedness
is rampant and crime holds high
carnival? White Caps in the
North, destroying the peace of
communities, and negroes in the
South rioting in murder?
It is the efforts of maleficients
and ruffians to throw off the re-
straints of law in the one case, and
the overflow of malignant passions,
indulged by unprincipled mis-
creants, in the other.
Within the last few days the
evil authorities of Indiana and
Ohio have compelled the submission
of the White Caps, and the authori-
ties of Mississippi will just as cer-
tainly restore order to that com-
monwealth.
The news from Wallhalla, Miss.,
is well calculated to arouse the
white people throughout the
United States. We are not in
possession of all the facts. We
only know that a constable's posse,
in the discharge of official duty,
was fired upon, on last Sanday-
night, by a party of negroes in an
ambush, and several white men were
killed.
We have no doubt the hour of
retribution will come, and the per-
petrators of the outrage meet the
penalty of their crimes.
Let it not be supposed that this
hideous affair evinces the retro-
gression of mankind. It is a dark
and bloody incident of the race
problem that has been thrust upon
us, and which will find its solution
in the absolute supremacy of the
white man.
It is unquestionably the interest
of the races in the South to live in
peace together. It is the part of
patriotism, humanity and Christian-
ity to leave nothing undone to ac-
complish so desirable a result, but,
if negroes will not know their
place and permit peace and har-
mony to accomplish their beneficent
results, they must bear the conse-
quences that will inevitably follow.
No doubt the triumph of the Re-
publican party in the national elec-
tion has had a disturbing influence
in arousing expectations in the
colored people that cannot be real-
ized.
But this will soon pass away
and in a little while the sovereignty
of law will assert itself and order
be restored.
In the meantime we counsel
moderation, and that self-pro-
tection that is consistent with manhood,
justice and right.
We speak for the white people
both in the assertion that no wrong
is intended to the negro, and the
emphatic declaration that white
supremacy must and shall be pre-
served.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY.
So long as we have a country to
love, so long must there be a party
to defend it. Other parties are
parties of expediency; the Demo-
cratic party is a party of principle.
There have been parties in the
United States, but all Democratic
platforms, from the organization
of the party to the present time,
have insisted on a strict construc-
tion of the Constitution, and the
limitation of the federal govern-
ment to powers and prerogatives
expressly conferred upon it. In the
nature of things the party must
continue to be, as it has ever been,
the bodyguard of the Constitution.
Never was the party in better
condition. It has often been in
better position for the accomplish-
ment of the ends of the people, but
never has it been more firmly en-
trenched in the confidence and
affection of the people.
Vance, Ransom, Morgan,
Burley, Vest, and their Demo-
cratic colleagues of the Senate;
Simmons, Brockridge, Oak, Car-
lisle, and their party associates of
the House, are standing by their
flag, and disputing every advance
towards centralization, and the
overthrow of the rights of the
States and the liberties of the citi-
zen.
Governors of States, and State
Legislatures, are asserting the
same immutable principles, and
better than all this, the people of
all sections have renowned their
views on the affairs of their country.
It is questionable whether the
Democratic party is more potent
for good when it is in charge of the
government, or when it stands
as a stern bulwark against the en-
croachment of its enemies, and success
is the precursor of public robbery
and national dishonor.
Let every Democratic organiza-
tion maintain its discipline, and
every member realize that to him
is intrusted the defense of the
nation and the security of the peo-
ple.

**THE Philadelphia Record, one of
the best and soundest of news-
papers, concludes an article on cot-
ton as follows:
Cotton raising is certainly one of
the great industries of the South.
The labor engaged in it competes, with
out protection, against the cheap
labor in the world. As the great
bulk of our cotton is sold to
foreign countries, it would seem to
be an inconceivable stupidity to
add in any way to the cost of pro-
ducing it in saleable condition.
The tax now levied upon cotton
is 35 cents per bale, which the cotton
planter must pay. The Senate has
voted against the repeal of the tax,
and the Senate bill proposes to in-
crease it to 108 cents.
There can be no defense of such
taxation. It would be impolitic
even if the country stood in need
of the revenue obtained from cot-
ton taxes, because it cripples and
production peculiarly adapted to
the United States. But in the
present state of the Treasury,
which is running over with the
proceeds of extra taxation, the
proposal lacks nothing of barbaric
severity and obtuseness.
