The North State of Greenbrier tells of one of its farmers, Mr. Webb Wood, who raised 93 1/2 bushels of onions in less than a half acre of land. He sold them for \$48.35. There is good money in raising crops that bring in \$100 per acre.

The clerk of the Superior Court has appointed Alexander M. Williams of Vancouver, a Justice of the Peace of the first township, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of the late Wm. H. Ellison. Mr. Williams qualified before the clerk yesterday.

The applicants for the vacancy in the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts are requested to meet Dr. Long in his office for examination on Monday August 1st at 9:30 a.m. in writing paper and pencil for a written examination.

Capt. J. W. Etheridge was in the city Tuesday buying 150,000 feet of lumber to construct 20 houses for the life saving stations to be used by those stationed there. One house of the kind proposed has already been built and found satisfactory. One of those contemplated is to be put at each remaining station in the district.

A nineteen year old white woman of questionable character from Yadkin county, was found dead in the woods at Winston, Thursday. She is supposed to have been shot by a young man named Duffield. They had been intimate, but had disagreed, though he was with her near the scene of the murder when she was last seen alive. His present whereabouts are not known.

Hon. R. F. Grady was re-nominated a Clinton. There was a good nomination present, and the meeting was an interesting one. J. A. Shaw, of Cumberland county, was elected the Presidential elector. At the close of the convention a number of third party delegations withdrew and held a meeting of their own. The Clinton county delegates stood firm for Cleveland and Democracy.

R. B. Kinsey, La Grange, has called for third party meetings to be held in the townships of Lenoir county on Saturday, July 30th, to elect delegates to the county convention which will meet in Kinston, August 4th, to select delegates to the State convention. The latter is to meet in Raleigh, August 16th, to nominate candidates for State offices and select presidential electors for the State at large.

Prof. Chas. D. McVey, President of the Female Industrial and Normal School of Greensboro anticipates a large crowd at the opening of that institution this fall. President McVey will make that school an institution worthy of the patronage of all parents who desire to give their daughters a practical business education. He is a strong advocate of female education and rightly claims that the girls should have equal advantages with her brother.

The masked fishing season has commenced at Morehead. The first parties went out Wednesday. One boat contained Mr. and Mrs. Howser of Phila., Miss Zoller, of Chicago, Miss Harris of Raleigh, and Misses W. W. Clark and C. S. Sett, of New Bern. The other boat had only Judge W. A. Hoke, of Lincolnton, and Ed. Chambers Smith of Raleigh, and a boy, a nephew of Mr. Smith. They were out about three hours, and as a result of their sport they brought 280 pounds of the beautiful and delicious Spanish masked. Good fishing such as this is.
