SUPPOSED CASE IN MINNESOTA.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 13.—E. L. Delaney of Northfield, this State, has been taken seriously ill with what is considered Asiatic cholera. He was at the State Fair in charge of a lot of imported horses from France that arrived in New York just previous to the quarantine proclamation. It is thought that the infection was caused from the baggage which came over with the horse. The physicians refuse to talk.

ONE DEATH IN NEVADA.

VIROGINA, Nev., Sept. 13.—A man named Gland died at Empire yesterday. The doctors report that his disease was genuine cholera.

THE ASIATIC INVADER.

More Cases Reported—Suspicious Character Arrested Near Norfolk.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Three other cases are reported to day in the city and two cases in Brooklyn one of which died in a few hours.

Also New Haven is greatly excited over what is thought to be a genuine case.

On Feb. 13th a man was taken to Mr. Bond on the same and I quote the following from his report: "I did not see the man, but myself realized that the whole question of drinking about the mouth of Pamlico river could be solved at once by entry of the beds said to have been quarantined. There is no obstacle, except my own sense of propriety, to my entering the area myself. But it was the intention of the legislature to do so, and I have no objection to the entry of the beds, and certainly the whole Fish Commissioners and largest traders very hard to carry out. The intention was learned in Raleigh that new beds had been quarantined. I drafted the bill sent you in Raleigh, and copied it here. Both I who suggested, and you who introduced, a measure which would preserve to the State a valuable piece of property, deserve thanks instead of abuse."

The next letter is the following: STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, BALTIMORE, N. C., February 12th, 1892.

Very respectfully, your obedient servant, S. T. TRILAIR, Private Secy.

My letter and accompanying bill were handed to Gov. Lowe by Mr. Bond. On Feb. 13th, Mr. Bond wrote me of his action and conversation with the Governor. I quote Mr. Bond's letter: "The Governor said: 'What have I to do with this bill and accompanying bill?'"

The newspapers for twelve months past, have been full of reports of new beds, etc. Two hours later he handed the papers to John Mann stating that they had been sent to him but they were beyond my jurisdiction.
