THE CHINESE EXCLUSION ACT.

The Federal Supreme Court sustains the constitutionality of the Chinese Exclusion Act.

This may be a case somewhat like that which caused the great apostle to exclaim: "All things are lawful but all things are not expedient."

Very much doubt the wisdom of enforcing this law. Will a American interest, civilization and Christianity be advanced by it?

If the court was fully agreed as to its constitutionality, grave doubts would be entertained as to its expediency; but, with such learned judges as Chief Justice Fuller and Justice Field and Brewer dissenting from the decision of the court, the gravity of the situation is greatly enhanced.

China is a submissive and feeble nation, but continued wrongs will eventually arouse the resentment of any people.

The *lex talionis* may be invoked, and American merchants and missionaries be compelled to leave the Celestial Empire.

Existing treaties give Americans special advantages and privileges which it is supremely folly to recklessly throw away.

But, however serious may be the injury to commerce, the blow to Christianity will be infinitely more disastrous if Americans are driven from the China Mission field because of political complications.

Our fathers did right to sever Church and State, but the religious sentiment is strongest with our people, and it is the duty of the Government to respect it.

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COMMENCEMENT OF THE STATE NORMAL AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

The first school year of the State Normal and Industrial School, which opened on the 25th of May.

The institution, which is located on the campus of the University, has a faculty of 120 students, and a corps of 100 teachers.

The school is a combination of a normal school and an industrial school, and is designed to prepare students for both teaching and manual labor.

The State Board of Pensions has just issued an order, that will appear in the columns of the JOURNAL, which it will be well for all parties interested to observe.

If there are those who believe that it is time for tributes to Confederate soldiers to cease, we beg them to consider that the men who fought the battles of the South acted in obedience to the commands of their States, and displayed virtues worthy of perpetual remembrance. Their names are forever enshrined in the memories of the virtuous and the good, and future generations will pay grateful homage to their splendid heroism and sublime devotion to duty.
